Getting Thrown Under the Bus

"We can do nothing to save ourselves. Without the generous help of someone else, we have no hope, which is exactly what Jesus offers each of us." Iesus told a lot of stories.

Somebody would ask Him a question, and He would often reply, "Let me tell you a story..."

I have to think this was one of the things that attracted people to Jesus. He wasn't a preacher as we often think of preachers (myself included I suppose). Typically, when we think of preachers, we attach words such as: "preachy" or "long-winded" or "condescending." These words don't describe Jesus in the slightest. He rarely gave long answers. He never came across as arrogant or finger-pointing. He was gentle. He would typically respond with a simple and engaging little story. People love stories.

One particular day was just like all the others. Jesus was passing through a town, and a crowd gathered. The situation apparently turned into a bit of a Q & A, because we read in Luke 10:25 that, "an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus" by asking him a question. He said, "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

This man was an "expert in the law." Today, we call these folks attorneys—or lawyers. Back then the "law" that they were experts in was the "law of Moses" or the various commands that are outlined in

the Old Testament books of Exodus through Deuteronomy. Lawyers were the religious elite, and were looked up to by the common people. If anyone was a lock for getting into heaven, it was an expert in the law.

This particular man, in this particular town, on this particular day, decided to test Jesus. He asked what it took to get into heaven. The fact was, he already knew the answer. What he really wanted to know was if Jesus was worthy of the title "Teacher" or "Rabbi." His question wasn't curiosity-based, it was arrogance-based.

Like the Samaritan man in the story, Jesus stops to care for us. He gave His life on the cross to pay for our sins. His blood has the power to heal our wounds physically, emotionally and spiritually. He died and rose again to save us from all our sins and pride.

But instead of answering the question, Jesus turned the question back on the lawyer. "You tell me. What is written in the law?"

I'm sure this frustrated the lawyer a bit, because he was trying to put Jesus on trial. The last thing he wanted was to be put on trial himself. He answered the question correctly ("Love God and love your neighbor as yourself"), but this didn't satisfy his curiosity. He still didn't know if Jesus had all the right answers, and was worthy of being called "Teacher." So he pressed a bit further by asking a follow-up question: "And who is my neighbor?"

It's at this point that Luke gives us an interesting detail. We're told that the man "wanted to justify himself." What I believe this means is that the lawyer believed that he knew the right answer. He knew that the law outlined who it is we're supposed to love: the orphan, the widow, the foreigner, the outcast, the poor, etc. Once again, the lawyer wasn't curious. He wanted to

see if Jesus could give the right answer. And by doing so, the man would be justified. His list would be confirmed. And he could walk away assured of his eternal standing—because these were things he was very careful to do. Check... check...check.

It's here that Jesus turns everything upside-down. He throws the lawyer under the bus. And He does it by telling a simple little story. Jesus tells of a man walking the treacherous mountain road from Jerusalem to Jericho (a road most everyone was familiar with). He describes a man who was robbed and beaten (a situation that was common-place on that road). He explains how a priest and a Levite walk right on by the beaten man (which is exactly what you would expect them to do). The only person to help was a Samaritan man, who was THE LAST PERSON ON EARTH the lawyer would want to be.

Instead of confirming the lawyer's list of people that ought to be helped, which would have reinforced his false belief that he was right on track in his efforts to gain eternal life, Jesus left only one option for who the lawyer was in the story (certainly not the hated Samaritan)—the victimized traveler who could do nothing to help himself. In effect Jesus was, throwing the lawyer under the bus. The lawyer was the "neighbor" who needed to be rescued and helped.

Why is this important to us?

It's because the vast majority of people believe that by doing the minimum requirement of "good deeds," we will justify ourselves and earn our way into heaven (thus justifying ourselves). It's the answer the lawyer was clearly fishing for—and it is THE EXACT OPPOSITE OF THE GOSPEL.

The Gospel pierces our hearts with the truth that, just like the man beaten and left for dead along the side of the road, each of us are in desperate need of being rescued. We can do nothing to save ourselves. Without the generous help of someone else, we have no hope, which



Board of Administration Meeting Highlights

The Board of Administration met on Wednesday, March 13, 2019, in the Administrative Office Conference Room. Chairman Glenn Watson called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Scott Bert opened the meeting with devotions and prayer. Following are highlights from this meeting:

Report of the Annual Financial Audit

Dave Rotz reported that King Street's 2018 annual Financial Audit has been completed and he reported that there was no evidence of significant errors. As of December 31, 2018, cash balances, bank statements and investment portfolio were all in order. He commended Debbie Watson for her detailed attention to the books.

Senior Pastor's Report:

Pastor Jody Bowser gave kudos to Pastor Adam Keath and the Celebrate Recovery Leadership team for their continued efforts in growing the church and leading people to Christ. CR is an important ministry, not just for King Street, but for the entire community. Our basketball outreach ministry is seeing God at work in significant ways, truly seeing ministry happen. Corporate prayer is on the rise as people reach out to be prayed over after worship services.

Pastor Jody posed this question: For those who have attended 30 years, how many have at least one person they are close to, have confidence in their understanding of biblical knowledge (can lead someone else to Christ) and have an understanding of their spiritual gifts? Over the next six months King Street's Vision journey will continue shifting toward building relationships, creating community, knowing doctrine and growing the congregation's sense of gifting.

Our Easter theme is "Safely Home." We will have eight services—one on Saturday night, six on Sunday morning and one on Monday night.

Executive Pastor's Report:

Don Baker shared that Celebrate Recovery (CR) should be viewed as a King Street Worship Service. Nick Randle and the CR worship team he has in place are blessing those in attendance. Jeremy Arnett recently gave his testimony during the CR Worship Service and over 80 people were in attendance. There are nine people in the current partnership class. Once More Ministries served over 150 families on Saturday, March 9. The Agape English Ministry is thriving (thank you, Sue Marshall). Don is amazed by how many events and meetings are being held—our facilities are being used well. We are leveraging what God has given us to serve both the congregation and the community.

Elder's Report

Greg West shared that the elder candidate training has been completed and our new Board of Elders is ready to hit the ground running with the startup of our new Vision journey. We congratulate Greg in becoming Vice-Chairperson of the King Street Board of Administration as he fulfills his role as Elder Chairperson.

Co-mission Reports:

• Adult Ministries — Mark Willson encourages everyone to join in the CR Worship. The Festival of Tables was held on March 16. There are currently more than 125 widows at King Street and the volunteers focusing on recently bereaved are a small group and would welcome more help. A four week church-wide study will begin April 1. A local ministries gathering is being planned. The co-mission is assessing its role in helping people determine their spiritual gifts. The co-mission wants to connect with people to find out what's going on, pray with them as needed, celebrate with them and take

concerns to leaders.

- Children's Ministry Alexander Rosenbaum requested prayer for Lisa Todino and for coverage while she is out following surgery. Alexander met with Becky Hann and staff last month to review and solidify the co-mission's responsibilities and to discuss how best the co-mission could help the staff recruit and encourage volunteers. The co-mission is focusing on coming up with ways they can be intentional in the recruiting process. Other agenda items for their March meeting were finding the best ways to determine spiritual gifts, holding equipping seminars for parents to be encouraged on raising their children for the Kingdom and connecting the After School Program kids with church families to help grow community connections. The Mother/Son Roundup was "a blast" with at least 50 volunteers and over 200 mothers and sons in attendance. Melanie Zook, Lisa Myers, Rosanna Book and Paula Shaffer were approved as new members of the co-mission.
- Finance Brad Etchberger shared that King Street has a very workable and solid financial system in place. Ken Adams reviewed the February financial report and noted that the monthly giving and expenses were above budget. Snow removal has exceeded our annual allowance. Year-to-date and average weekly giving is below budget for 2019.
- Missions Scott Bert shared that effective May 1, a new fundraising policy and a new fundraising process will be implemented. The policy states that Mission Co-Mission trips will have 1/3 of the cost paid by the participant; 1/3 paid by individual and team fundraising efforts and 1/3 paid by the Mission Co-Mission. The process ensures that individuals and groups do not receive multiple requests from people going on the same trip. Discussion was had regarding Kayla Kingsley, who plans to go to Nepal in August for a two-year term with Operation Globalization, during which she will be evangelizing to unreached people groups.

Motions to give a one-time gift for startup costs and to provide yearly support prorated on the date of her actual departure passed.

- Personnel Relations Kim Shatzer reported that the food service position continues to be unfilled, with no prospects. The decision was made to just leave the position open and don't push. If a potential applicant comes forward, tailoring the job description could be considered. A motion to hire a day shift custodian, Terry Martin, was approved. Becky Hann has been given authority to hire temporary help as needed, under the guidance of Don Baker. We have a wonderful slate of intern candidates: Ouintin Graves for Local-Global Outreach: McKenna Flint and Mitchell Bowser for Worship; Lauren Dukehart and Issy Balboa for Student Ministries and Kara Wiley for Children's Ministries. A motion to add a fall intern, Ashley Winters, for three to four months starting in August was approved.
- Property Jim Goetz shared that Larry Andrews completed all his paperwork for security clearance and will be returning to the team. The usher's biannual meeting will be held on April 7. A motion that a design/build process be started for the first floor hallway redesign, which will allow us to obtain prices to consider from contractors was approved. Settlement was completed on March 1 on the 18 North Second Street property. A motion that we get prices for asbestos abatement and demolition of the property was approved. A motion to proceed with the purchase of an automated coffee maker in the Baker kitchen was approved. Jim shared that Tyler Roberts researched a new screen and projector for the CMC. A motion supporting Tyler's recommendation was approved. Parking continues to be an issue, especially during the week in the Baker Lot. A motion that we add signage that says: "Church Parking Only" and "Violators will be Towed" was approved. A motion that

Suzanne Piper be approved as chairperson of the Decoration Committee passed.

• **Student Ministry** – Penny Poorman shared that on February 24 there were 31 attendees for Road Crew training on social media, cell phone/ device habits and communication. Student attendance has been steady, averaging 60 to 70 for middle school and 70 for high school. The Wednesday night topic for high school is "30 Days to Live" and for middle school is "The Talk." Upcoming events: March 31–mission trip registration deadline, April 17 - Night o' Peeps, April 24th - Senior Night, May 1 last Street Meeting (Group Night), September 21-youth ministry training via simulcast. John and Amanda Shadle have started a college age Bible study. Basketball ministry is completed for this year. Penny shared that God continues to be sighted in the lives of students.

• Worship Arts – Chuck Schussler stated that ideas were shared for Vision Team goals. Some of the ideas discussed include using music to get scripture into our hearts, expanding the vision of worship arts by using calligraphy, art, photos, and pottery, helping people to apply worship throughout the week through Spotify and playlists on the website and becoming involved with drama and skits. Scott shared that the appreciation card ministry will continue. Services coming up include: Journey to the Cross-March 24 at 5:00, Maundy Thursday Service–April 18 at 6:00 and the Good Friday Service. An organ project to add digital voices instead of adding pipes was discussed. There is currently over \$50,000 in the fund; the cost of the project is \$100,000. A previous Board of Administration decision stated that only the Organ Fund could be used for organ projects. That decision is supported by the current BOA.

Administrative Report:

Ken Adams noted that the United Brethren National Conference will take place on July 17–20

and registration is now open. Lay delegates have received an email explaining registration, lodging and travel expenses. Ken shared that he received thank you notes from members of our congregation and guests expressing gratitude for the church's support in areas such as student grants, funerals, etc. Ken Adams presented the BOA with an updated financial resolution to cover our current Endowment and Generation Next Step accounts. A motion to approve the financial resolution and the authorized officers was approved. Ken indicated that the church is adding a "Text To Give" option as a new means to contribute. The staff Lead Team is currently testing the process. The church is also investigating cloud data exchange for our email services and extending the warranty on our server through Dell. A motion that we proceed with the email exchange upgrade and to extend the server warranty for one year was approved.

The Children's Co-Mission is made up of church partners that work alongside Becky Hann and the children's ministry staff to encourage and assist in God's work. They meet every other month to discuss children's ministries activities and to focus on ways our children can be blessed with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Alexander and his wife, Brielle, have been volunteering with our children's ministry for several years, initially because as partners, they believed they were called to serve. He is amazed at how "serving actually fills me up and helps me engage my faith by 'living the call' not just by hearing truth every Sunday ... when I serve, I often expect to feel exhausted just by adding 'one more thing' to my list of to dos, but instead, I often feel joy, fulfillment and energy."

Alexander would love to see an overabundance of volunteers in the children's ministries. While the Lord has provided for all the "needs," the prayer is for people to step out and invest their time so that they will be overcome with such joy that they will recruit others to work for "upper story" goals. Alexander hopes that their example "inspires an entire generation of kids that are intentionally seeking to live out God's call on their lives."

Alexander was born and raised in Chambersburg and remembers asking Jesus to save him from his sins at the age of five. He has been attending King Street since he was three with his parents, Scott and April, and his younger brother, Austin. He was baptized by Pastor Pat Jones at a Rhodes Grove church picnic. 
What you need:










THE SEND marks start of "Greatest Iesus Movement"

Friends, this is an actual Fox News article headline. These are the days we are living in. On February 23 our entire Circuit Rider crew had the immense honor and privilege to be part of The Send at Camping World Stadium in Orlando, Florida. Over 58,000 gathered throughout the 12 hour day. It was filled with speakers, worship and most importantly—the presence of God.

We entered into the stadium that morning with so much faith and expectancy. People from the surrounding neighborhoods began coming into the stadium because they heard it was free and wondered what it was.

There are countless testimonies of people getting healed, set free and choosing to go to the mission field. One testimony says, "So last night, God completely and totally removed all of my depression, anxiety, and over 4680 cutting scars. I used to be scared to preach the gospel but God put boldness in me." There are

SO MANY stories like this. People have had countless scars be healed and disappear because that's our God. There is even a girl in our community who has suffered from fibromyalgia for over 12 years, often in a wheelchair, and SHE GOT HEALED!

The Send is a war on inaction. Throughout the day, every believer was called to take action. Over 16,656 committed to fasting, 2145 committed to reaching high schools, 1878 committed to reaching universities, 4134 committed to reaching their neighborhood and close to 500 responded to the gospel.

The Mission Field of Adoption

Throughout the day of The Send, various missions fields were highlighted: high schools, neighborhoods, local churches and universities. In the afternoon two families took the stage, shared their stories and invited the stadium into the mission field of adoption. One of our YWAM and Circuit Rider leaders, Andy, and his family have now adopted two girls out of foster care.

Andy shared that instead of being satisfied with defining maturity as simply taking responsibility for our own actions, God is raising up a generation that would define maturity as taking responsibility for the actions and the brokenness of those around us. He used Jesus as the example: "Praise God that when Jesus came to earth He didn't say, 'Hey I didn't cause this sin. I didn't cause this brokenness; you're on your own,' but instead He came and said, 'Hey I didn't cause it. I didn't cause this sickness. I didn't cause this brokenness but I will take responsibility for it."

There are over 100,000 children in our foster care system waiting to be adopted. Within the first year after those children age out, 50% will end up homeless, 50% will become drug addicted and 50% will end up in prison someday. Andy shared how we all have a choice. We all have a choice as to what we will do about the brokenness around us.

The WWII Hero Generation wasn't named that before the war, but rather how they responded throughout. A generation's willingness to stand up in the midst of a crisis could define us as the most adoptive generation in history. Lou Engle prayed and shared that we have no authority to end abortion unless we want the children more than those who don't.

Whether it's adopting out of foster care or getting children living as orphans back home, two families changed by adoption stood on stage inviting us to bring one million children home.

Tour Update

There's just so much to say about the Send and I could write for ages, but I do want to give a quick tour update. Between 12 Carry the Love teams in universities and high schools and about five weeks of tour, here is how God is moving in our nation:

21,600+ have gathered at events

1300+ have been saved

Our generation wants Jesus. Watch for future updates with some amazing testimonies from tour.
