Looking at Christmas With 2020 Eyes

"I believe with all my heart that God is moving in ways far beyond what we can see." Most of us have become very familiar with the Christmas story. Given the fact that we only have four chapters in the Bible that record the events of the birth of Christ (Mathew 1-2; Luke 1-2), these chapters receive a great deal of focus during Advent season.

This repetition, I think, is a really good thing. Familiarity can be very comforting. It's like visiting an old friend. Take, for example, Luke 2:8-9 as read from the King James Version: "And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them, and they were sore afraid."

What do you think of when you hear this? Perhaps you think of family Christmas celebrations in your home or candlelight Christmas Eve services. I think of Linus. There stood Linus (of Charlie Brown fame) alone on the stage, in the spotlight, holding his blanket and sucking his thumb, and in the most innocent and childlike voice, reciting Luke chapter 2 in answer to Charlie's question: "Isn't there anyone who knows what Christmas is all about?"

Familiarity, however, can also cause us to miss or gloss over some very important details. We can hear something so many times that we simply take for granted that was how things were. This, I think, is true of numerous aspects of the Christmas narrative.

Caesar Augustus was the emperor of the Roman empire at the time of the birth of Christ. But he was thought to be more than that, really. If you can imagine—churches were being built in cities all over the Roman world (which was basically the entire civilized world with a recorded history) that literally worshipped Caesar as god. Let that sink in. You went to church, bowed down and sang worship songs to Caesar Augustus.

We read in Luke 2:1 that "In those days, there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be taxed." Not this country or that country—but the entire world! Every countable person on earth was REQUIRED to travel to their ancestral home to be entered into the Roman worldwide database, and PAY EXORBITANT sums of money. (I can promise you that it was enough to make you steaming mad.) How's that for government interference in the holiday season!

Mary, nine months pregnant with her first child, had to travel over a hundred miles with no medical care and no plans whatsoever as to how to handle a delivery. We often think of her on a donkey, but it's probable that she walked the entire way. She had to do this with a man she wasn't even married to because the baby she was obviously carrying was thought to be his. Her parents weren't with her because they didn't have the same ancestral home as Joseph. It's also highly likely that Mary was in her middle-teens and Joseph wasn't much older.

When Joseph and Mary finally got to a place they knew nothing about, they find that the place is overrun with people and there is absolutely no place for them to even spend the night. That was the precise time when Mary went into labor. The BEST they could find was an obscure, dark, smelly lambing cave with nothing more than a feeding trough for animals.

Don't forget that this was all because a wicked, greedy, emperor was FORCING every person on the face of the earth to go places they didn't want to go to give away enormous sums of money that they couldn't afford to give. Do you suppose there might have been just a little frustration in the air?

So here we are in 2020. I find it really interesting how I've always viewed the term 20/20. I've thought of it as meaning "perfect vision." It doesn't actually mean "perfect." It means that you are able to read the eighth row down on the Snellen Eye Chart from a distance of 20 feet. Twenty feet in your right eye. Twenty feet in your left eye. Some people can do a little better than that (by reading rows 9 and 10), most do a little worse.

I suppose that for all of us who have now lived through most of this past year (a new year is right around the corner!)—we'll now think of something far different than "perfect vision" when we hear the numbers "twenty-twenty." The words that will come to my mind will be "difficult," "Covid," "quarantine" and "politics." So much has changed in such a short time. So much that makes me sad.

My encouragement, though, is that by looking at Christmas through 2020 eyes, we might see some of the realities that we've never seen before. For those people who were living in that year of Christ's birth (for all intents and purposes—it was the year "Zero"), they probably would have used words like "difficult," "taxes," "wretched Caesar" and "census." But unbeknownst to most, God was working in MIGHTY ways! The Lower Story was hard—but the Upper Story was being accomplished in unbelievable ways.

Board of Administration Meeting Highlights

The Board of Administration met on Wednesday, October 14, 2020 in Room M7. Chairman Glenn Watson called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Mark Willson opened the meeting with devotions and prayer. Following are highlights from that meeting.

Senior Pastor's Update:

Pastor Jody was away on study leave and was absent.

Executive Pastor's Update:

Pastor Don shared that our return to five Sunday morning worship services was scheduled for Sunday, October 18. All services except the 11 a.m. Baker service are mask required services. Congratulations to John Shadle on his upcoming transition to his role as Senior Pastor at Prince Street UB Church in Shippensburg. There are nine child dedications scheduled to take place on November 1. Don shared that Adam Keath is excited to announce that RESET is scheduled to begin in the Baker Center on Monday evening, November 2.

Elder Team Report:

Greg West shared that prayer is requested that we remain loving to the entire congregation as we try to stay in the right lane with the continuing COVID crisis. A motion that we open up the church facilities for our church youth basketball teams carried unanimously. Greg will provide feedback as to the success of this request at the next BOA meeting.

Co-Mission Reports:

• Adult Ministries — Mark Willson shared that plans are being considered to have adult ministry leaders come to co-mission meetings to share and compare thoughts and ideas. A spring meeting is also being planned for L3 group leaders to come together to share and

compare ideas. The co-mission is encouraging Sunday school leaders to lead with intentionality. Mark is excited that new leaders are starting to emerge.

- **Children's Ministry** The Children's Ministry Co-Mission met on October 5. Alexander Rosenbaum shared that thirty-five children are attending the Kidztown Crossing school program. On Sunday mornings, due to volunteer limitations and spacing restrictions, only one class for each elementary grade is being held. More volunteers are needed who are willing to teach on a regular basis. A family Christmas celebration will be held on December 2 at the Goldfish Barn. It will be held in two sessions: one from 5:30–6:30 and one from 7:00–8:00.
- **Finance** Brad Etchberger said that the co-mission was scheduled to meet on Monday, October 19 at 7 p.m. Dan Gehris gave a detailed financial update including September financial results and YTD figures. Dan shared that September undesignated giving was down compared to budget.
- Local Outreach Sharon Bowers joined the meeting this evening in the absence of Tamy Cook. The LOC met on October 6 and enjoyed a ministry partner share. Carl Matice from Rhodes Grove Camp gave a presentation. The KSC Service Central website has been helpful for encouraging volunteers. The LOC will be intentionally discussing ways to encourage more volunteers to step forward. The next scheduled meeting is November 10. This will be the quarterly meeting with our ministry partners.
- **Missions** The Missions Co-Mission met on September 28. Scott Bert shared that the book *When Helping Hurts* was introduced. Bryan and Emily Gerlach are ending their time with TEAM and relocating to the US, most likely before the end of this year. Bryan intends to continue working on his graduate degree and plans to get a full-time job. The Missions

Co-Mission's 2021 budget was also discussed.

- **Personnel Relations** Kim Shatzer shared that the staff Christmas luncheon will be held on December 9. The co-mission agreed that staff birthday cards will be continued as a form of staff recognition. A motion to offer Samantha Ray the part time position of Coordinator of Guest Experience carried unanimously.
- **Property** The Property Co-Mission met on October 5. Dale Forney shared that parking sign installations are ongoing, as is the delivery of new nursery furniture. John Little is continuing to research the Baker Center elevator repair. The Baker Center roof project is approximately 50% complete. The Ushers Manual and Security Plan from 2007 are in review to determine necessary updates. The Student Ministry remodeling project review continues. Quotes and designs are being obtained from Scott Rosenbaum for landscaping for the church parking lot. Planter and fountain removal in the courtyard is ongoing. A quote has been received for the Meadows roof repair. A motion to approve the needed repairs carried unanimously.
- Worship Arts The Worship Arts Co-Mission met on October 5. Carolyn Chenaille opened discussion regarding replacement of the computers in both the Baker Center and the Sanctuary that operate ProPresenter media. A motion to purchase two new iMacs carried unanimously. Carolyn shared that a video similar to the "Christmas at Home" video from a few years ago will be filmed in early November. On December 16 an Outdoor Christmas @ Country Creek event will be held that is family friendly, with a heated tent, Christmas caroling and animals. Youth worship has restarted. On November 22 we are having a Thanks and Praise service with a canned food drive.

Administrative Report:

A discussion was held regarding Chambersburg's 6th Annual Responders Appreciation Day. A motion to approve a financial donation for 2020 carried unanimously.

Mark Willson closed the meeting with prayer at 9:38 p.m.






What you need:



Grateful in November

In November we expressed our thanks for just a few of the many ways that God has worked in our midst in 2020. Here are the areas we focused on:

November 1: RESET

We praise God for allowing us to launch RESET, a new worship service and support system that meets on Monday nights at 6:30 p.m. in the Baker Center.

November 8: Media & Production and Online Church Community

The coronavirus pandemic has brought many unexpected challenges to our year. We praise God that our Media & Production ministry was able to rise to the challenge of offering more worship services online, as well as assisting other ministries in going virtual. We are also grateful to our loyal online community who continues to engage weekly; every person who worships with us remains a vital part of our church family.

November 15: Kidztown Crossing

In August our Children's Ministry launched Kidztown Crossing to meet the needs of CASD kids whose parents are working during the day. We welcomed more than 40 kids into our building to help them complete their online learning and to share God's Word with them. We praise God for this vision, for the hard work of our Children's Ministry staff, and for this opportunity to engage and bless our community with the Gospel.

November 22: Generosity in Giving

In the midst of all the challenges brought on by COVID this year, KSC leadership made a faith commitment early on to continue to live out our mission of engaging and blessing our community and also our core value of being missionally engaged. In addition to the numerous hands-on ministry efforts, we have also been able to give over \$400,000 (just from our church budget—not including Sunday school class giving) to local ministry partners, special giving (six local churches, support for hospital workers, KidzTown Crossing, etc.) and international missions. Although our overall income is down 5% for 2020, our overall missional giving is up significantly over previous years!

June L. Brown, age 89, of Chambersburg, Pa., passed away on Thursday, June 4, 2020. She served 35 years as a United Brethren missionary in Sierra Leone.

You can read June Brown's obituary on the Geisel Funeral home website. In lieu of flowers, memorial contributions may be made in her name to UB Global, 302 Lake St., Huntington, IN 46750. Designate "Sierra Leone Hospital" on the memo line. Contributions can also be made to the King Street Church Joy Class, 56 North Second St., Chambersburg, PA 17201.

Below is a summary of June's story as told in *All for Christ, Volume 2*, by Steve Dennie.

"June Brown grew up in Pennsylvania. She accepted Christ at age eight, and at age 15 sensed God calling her to the mission field. She enrolled at Huntington College in 1948, but left to spend four years in the Women's Air Force. While stationed in San Antonio, Texas, she taught math and science


classes, and played on the base softball and basketball teams, both of which won the Women's Air Force World Championship. She returned to Huntington College in 1954, graduated in 1956, and became a public schoolteacher in Rockford, Ill. But the call to missions remained. In 1957, she began 35 years as a United Brethren missionary in Sierra Leone.

June's missionary service included six years as a teacher at Centennial Secondary School, followed by 29 years at Bumpe High School, where she taught math and Bible. She also served stints as boarding home manager, bookstore clerk and acting principal, and could ably step in when the school needed an electrician, plumber, or diesel mechanic.

During her furlough in 1966, June returned to Huntington College to teach physical education and coach basketball, volleyball, and tennis. In 1985, June took on the role of Director of Missionary Affairs. She remained in Sierra Leone until 1992, when all missionaries were evacuated from the country because of a military coup. She took the opportunity to retire from missionary service. June returned to her hometown of Chambersburg, Pa., and to her home church, King Street.

During Commencement services on May 18, 1993, Huntington College recognized her with the honorary Doctor of Humane Letters. The citation began:

'June L. Brown has built a life of excellence everywhere she has invested her talent and energy. In education, in service to country, and in missions, she has always held to the highest standards in her personal life and professional endeavors.'"

We are full speed into transition mode. We have set a leave date of December 2 and are in the process of wrapping up everything here to move out! We have so many cherished memories and dear friends; it has been really sweet reminiscing on our seven years in Thailand. Saying goodbye can be brutal, but all of the sadness just shows us how deep our relationships have grown with our friends in the Thai and missionary communities. The Lord has provided a great leader to step into Bryan's role at the Family Connection Foundation (FCF), has made a way for us to sell almost all of our worldly possessions (pray that we can find a buyer for Emily's car soon) and has confirmed our decision in countless other ways here.

We are also very excited that we have something to transition to Bryan has accepted an offer to work with HOPE International in Lancaster, PA! He will be the new Project Management Specialist for the marketing team and will start full-time on January 4. HOPE's mission is to invest in the dreams of families in the world's underserved communities as we proclaim and live the Gospel. They do this as they share the hope of Christ and provide biblically based training, savings services and loans that restore dignity and break the cycle

of poverty. We are so excited that we have this amazing organization to receive us when we get back to the US. God has really confirmed this direction every step of the way and it is such a blessing to know that we will still be involved in spreading the gospel, even as a part of Bryan's job description.

November is shaping up to be one of the busiest months of our lives, so please keep us in your prayers! We are planning to ship some items back to the US, sell others, and give the rest away. We are working to prioritize time with our friends here to say goodbyes. The kids have a bucket-list of things to do before we leave which we are checking off. Jameson is finishing up his preschool time. Bryan is transitioning out of his role at FCF, working on a marketing class for his MBA and will be starting part-time a few hours a week remotely with HOPE to get up to speed there too. Oh, and we are house shopping remotely in the Lancaster area. And that's not even mentioning all of the emotions that go with a move like this. There will be lots of tears I'm sure, from the kids too! Yikes!

He has been faithfully guiding us every step of the way and we trust that He will continue to do so. We cannot thank you enough for your love and support through our journey. Roger remains at our daughter Amanda's house. Now Christy and three others of her family are positive and Amanda is also. Two of the children and I are negative and in a separate house.

We are incredibly sad for Honduras and the two hurricanes back to back. A section of the country is under water. My son-in-law, Rigo, Christy's husband, wants to go back right away but the airport we usually fly into is under several feet of water. This will hamper relief efforts from out of the country.

■ Church is the ■ fellowship where we served for seven years before K was banned from entering ■. The church is now in a difficult time of transition with major leadership changes. In addition it is hard to keep motivation going due to Covid restrictions on meeting face to face. Pray for good solutions for church leadership and that not one sheep will be lost or wander away during these challenges.

K's Entry Ban Update

At the recommendation of ■ church leaders. last year we opened up a court case to contest K's entry ban to \blacksquare . This case has been working its way through the system. So far three court levels have considered the case and all have ruled that the **■** government is within its rights to issue a ban on any foreign citizen they wish. K's actions have not been considered in the hearings. In fact the file about him is sealed and his lawyer has not even had access to it! Within the next three months the
Constitutional Court will consider K's case. In the \blacksquare court system this is the final stop. We understand that at this level all files must be opened and considered. Several other workers also have cases before the Constitutional Court. Pray for greater freedom for Christian workers to be established in **through** a positive court decision. We would love to have an open door to return to .

Since the Messenger is online and available everywhere, precautions are necessary when sharing about missionaries serving in Muslim countries or other restricted areas. In order not to jeopardize our missionaries working in very challenging places, names and locations are excluded from some updates.
