I was driving through town the other day and the sign on the back of a work truck caught my attention. The truck was from some sort of installation company, perhaps internet service or telecommunications. The sign on the back of the truck was a larger than usual notice regarding social distancing ... indicating with a big black two-headed arrow that proper social distancing was 10 feet.

Since I was just sitting there at a red light, I had some time to think. Ten feet. I thought it was supposed to be six feet. But OK ... I get it. The company is trying to protect their personnel and are making it clear right from the start that when their specialist walks into my home or place of business, I need to stay a minimum of 10 feet away from them. They don't want my germs. It's intended as an emergency measure in the midst of a pandemic.

As I said, I had time to sit there and ponder for a few moments. Ten feet is a fairly substantial bubble of personal space. I think it actually takes some effort and awareness to remain 10 feet away from another person while interacting or talking with them. You're almost on the other side of the room. It's a little bit like, "Hey you over there!"

I'm not a scientist, so I can't begin to speak to the distance that aerosol particles can be propelled by a person while speaking, or coughing, or sneezing or breathing. Perhaps 10 feet is designed to protect in the event of the infrequent but still conceivable uncovered sneeze. In that case it is good policy.

What I am is a pastor and I can tell you that moving through life within a 10-foot bubble of personal space is not good for your soul. It's not good for your spirit. When we consciously stay that far away from others in the course of every day personal interactions, there is bound to be some emotional and spiritual damage that takes place. Something gets broken. Something gets lost. (Since it was a long light, I had plenty of time to sit there and think, "I wonder, when will they take that sign off the back of the truck? Will they ever take that sign off the back of the truck? Hmm....")

One of the various staff teams that we have here at King Street is our Creative Team led by Pastor Nathan. Nathan recently asked the team to share three or four words that they would like to have our church described as in the months ahead. In other words, what would we like to see our creative ideas ultimately accomplish? What are some words that we WANT to describe our church with?

As we went around the table, several words or concepts began to be repeated—words like "worshipful," "generous," "biblical" and "engaging." But there was one word that nearly every person offered. That word was *community*. "We want to see our King Street family come together." "We want to be a relational community." "We want to be a safe community, where we can feel free to be honest and open and where we will be taken care of." "We want to be a unified community." Community. Community.

Should this surprise us? I don't think so. I believe these responses reflect the deep need that all of us are feeling—especially now—to be connected. We have been created by God to

be in relationship, and yet the world we live in is saturated with messages to remain socially distanced.

I certainly don't want you to get Covid or any other illness for that matter. Common sense goes a long way when it comes to our health. But we have got some work to do as a society and as a church family, to heal and mend the things that have been lost or broken. Let it be our collective prayer that God will help us move forward as a unified community where all of us can feel safe, cared for and loved.

January 2022 Board of Administration Meeting Highlights

The Board of Administration met on Wednesday, January 12, 2022 in the KSC Choir Room. Chairman Glenn Watson called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Penny Poorman opened the meeting with devotions and prayer. Following are highlights from that meeting.

Glenn Watson initiated a discussion over Jeanne Amick being installed as the next BOA Recording Secretary. A motion to approve Jeanne Amick as the next BOA Recording Secretary was approved unanimously.

Senior Pastor's Report:

Pastor Jody shared that on December 15 over 1100 people attended the Country Creek Christmas event. Six services were held on Christmas Eve with about 1200 people present. The "Worthy" video was an exceptional blending of contemporary and traditional worship which had 800 live views and hundreds that watched it later.

Pastor Jody shared that Renee Hall had a servant's heart, she loved kids and Jesus. Pastor Jody shared that we celebrated Debbie Watson last Monday as she retires after 18 years of employment at KSC. We also welcome Andrea Hartman as our new Finance Assistant. Jody shared nine wins with 12 more to come with 21 wins in 2021.

Executive Pastor's Report:

Pastor Steve reiterated that we are all grieving the loss of Renee Hall and asked that we pray for Randal, Amelia and the Children's Ministry staff. Our next baptism class will be held on February 6. Pastor Steve met with Nathan Hann concerning Baker Center sound system upgrades. Pastor Steve is thankful for Tyler Roberts and the Media & Production Team

that came in to help make last Sunday possible in helping to connect people in worship when the church was closed due to winter weather. Communion is rescheduled for this week since it was canceled last week.

Elder Team Report:

Greg West reported on the compassion of KSC that he and his family experienced during the death of his parents. They felt the love from KSC and appreciated it at a very difficult time. "Thank you to the entire church."

Co-Mission Reports:

- Adult Ministry Mark Willson gave an update on L3 Groups and the culture that is growing within KSC. There are currently 47 active L3 Groups which represent nearly 500 adults. The "Roar Like a Mother" Women's Conference has been scheduled for March 19. The co-mission would appreciate prayers for this event.
- **Children's Ministry** Alexander Rosenbaum said that their co-mission meeting last month was canceled. Wednesday night activities have been postponed until January 19 as they all grieve the passing of Renee Hall. He asked that we pray for the co-mission and the staff who lost a dear friend. Pray for Becky Hann and the Children's Ministry team that they will be able to grieve as they continue to do the work of the Children's Ministry. Alexander requested prayers for this year's VBS as well.
- Finance Brad Etchberger said the Finance Co-Mission will meet on February 21. Dan Gehris shared that we were incredibly blessed financially in 2021. December's giving was well over budget and giving for 2021 was also over budget. Expenses for 2021 came in under budget. We deeply appreciate the generous hearts of those who attend KSC and praise God for His goodness.
- **Local Outreach** Sharon Bowers reported that the Christmas Eve offering was a tremendous blessing. She is confident that God

will supply a chairperson for the co-mission. Adam Keath and the co-mission are discussing the vision for Bless Fest this year. Their next meeting in February is the quarterly meeting with ministry partners and they will be discussing their needs.

- **Missions** Alyssa Heberlig gave an update on Haiti. Funds had been sent to repair the first 40 homes in the Les Cayes region. Most of these homes are complete and the rest are expected to be finished within the next few days. Marilyn and Roger Reeck recently retired and continue to be active in leading trauma healing seminars and Bible translation.
- **Personnel Relations** Kim Shatzer said the PRC met on January 5. The PRC will take action regarding Renee Hall's replacement. Kim mentioned that Caleb Ray gave his resignation effective January 21.
- **Property** Dale Forney reported that the Property Co-Mission met on January 3 with new members Steve Myers, Steve Mixell and Rodney Smith attending. They said goodbye to Jim Goetz who was a tremendous asset serving on the Property Co-Mission. Dale shared that the co-mission also expressed their gratitude for Jim's work with security over the years.

Nexgen building automation began last Thursday, January 6. We are replacing the refrigerator with a commercial one in Deb's Café. Installation of a Plexiglass screen for Deb's Café is being fabricated. The library project is ongoing.

- **Student Ministry** Penny Poorman shared that Winter Slam is the first weekend of February. The Student Ministry Co-Mission would appreciate your prayers for this event.
- Worship Arts Carolyn Chenaille reported that the new sound board has already been installed. "Worthy" was the largest production thus far and there have been hundreds of views and hundreds of downloads, including a global outreach. The Advent video has also been made available. It is having a global reach as well.

Administration Report:

Dan Gehris discussed the updated Financial Resolutions that now include Jeanne Amick to the position of BOA Recording Secretary and Andrea Hartman to the position of Finance Assistant. Motions to accept the Financial Resolutions passed unanimously. Dan shared the updated Staff Organizational Chart, the 2022 Board and Co-Mission Rosters and the 2022 BOA Contact List.

Penny Poorman closed the meeting with prayer at 8:51 p.m.



EMPTY SHOEBOXES




JUST FOR KIDS



- 1 package unflavored gelatin
- ³/₄ cup very warm water
- 1 tsp salt
- ¾ cup gel body wash
- Food coloring
- Rubbing alcohol in spray bottle
- Silicone baking molds

What you do:

- 1. In a bowl, stir gelatin and warm water until dissolved.
- 2. Add salt, body wash and a few drops of food coloring. Stir.
- 3. Spray molds with rubbing alcohol (to prevent bubbles). Place molds on a tray.
- 4. Pour mixture into the molds. Refrigerate until set, about two hours.
- 5. Pop soap out of molds and store in an airtight container.

I wanted to take a moment to say how grateful I am to each one of you for so faithfully continuing to support me through these past few months of loss and transition. I am so thankful for your financial support of my life in missions and even more so for the ways you all have carried my family and me in prayer, specifically over the past five months. Some days it's still hard to believe that my brother is really gone, but the Lord continues to carry us.

Count it All Joy

I celebrated my 25th birthday in December and I wrote the following paragraphs as I was reflecting on the previous months:

At the start of November, I felt so much dread. I wanted to skip ahead to January and dodge the holiday season completely. When I'd think about today, I'd hear my brother's voice echoing in my head, "Happy Birthday, Em!" But I won't hear him say it this year. I've never known a birthday without him. That's the thing with older siblings; they've always been part of your life. This is unfamiliar territory and it's painful to navigate.

"Count it all joy." I was offended when that phrase came to mind last night. Surely grief and loss are the exceptions. Why on earth should I count the recent months as joy? We count it all joy, not because of the trial itself but because of what the trial PRODUCES in us—steadfastness. God trains us and increases our capacity to endure. He shows us new sides of Him we've never seen because we've never needed them. He sets our feet on the firm foundation of who He is.

I'm still figuring out how to walk this road of grief, but in the midst of it there is still reason for thanksgiving and celebration. After all, He is the one who redeems what's been lost. He brings good and beauty even out of the ashes; He's just that good. I have a treasure chest full of gold I've mined out of the past few months and it is precious. I wouldn't trade it for anything. The Lord does bring good and He is getting glory.

The Big Announcement

The end of 2019 was when I first felt the Lord leading me to transition out of California. Since then, plans have changed more times that I can count due to Covid. There have been so many times over the past couple of years that I've felt lost and frustrated, but the Lord gently reminds me to trust Him. He's challenged my heart asking, "Do you really believe that I know what I'm doing?" After all, the Lord never promised to give me a detailed five year plan; He does, however, promise to never leave my side and He promises to work all things for my good. Where would be the need for my faith if He laid out all the answers before I even took one step forward?

Towards the end of 2020, I felt the Lord leading me to FAI (Frontier Alliance International). I was ready to leave the states behind and return to the world of foreign missions. Since it's launch in 2011, FAI teams have been ministering in strategic regions throughout the 10/40 window (visit https://joshuaproject.net/resources/articles/10_40_window to learn more about the 10/40 window). Like Hudson Taylor's China Inland Mission, our teams are laboring together in a concentrated and coordinated

advance into the "interior" regions of our generation where today there is still no witness.

I shared back in April that I was able to go to Kurdistan, a region in Northern Iraq, to visit a few FAI teams and locations. As I continued in conversations with FAI and started the process of joining them long term, I was seeking the Lord for clarity on where He was calling me geographically. I feel like I have a heart for foreign nations and people groups just as much as I have a heart for the Western world. My heart longs for the unreached peoples of the world to hear His name just as much as it longs for the church in the West to wake up to the reality that there is so much more than just going to a church service once a week. I found myself asking many times, "What are You doing, Lord? Why don't I feel called to just one region or place?"

Towards the end of summer when I was beginning the "on-boarding" process of joining FAI. I had a conversation with the director of the organization. He knew that I didn't have much of a preference on what location I ended up in and he threw out an invitation for me to join a small, pioneering FAI team in the states. A handful of people were in the process of moving here at the time and I remember him saying something along the lines of, "I can't even really give you a job description yet; we just know the Lord has clearly asked us to plant this team in Kentucky and we want to be obedient." So here's to a new season and another opportunity to walk by faith, believing the Lord is unfolding His plan and purpose for our little team here!

There are a lot of exciting things in the works that our team will be establishing here and I can't wait to share them with you! In my next email I will be detailing more of what we're doing and what our team is putting their

hands to. Also, over the next few emails I'll be introducing you all to FAI a little more — from the work we do in the nations, to the films that have been produced, etc. If you'd like to explore for yourself, here is the FAI website — https://www.faimission.org/. The start of the new year has been pretty busy for my teammates and me. With the beginning of 2022 also came the beginning of a new school year, new friendships and new experiences.

Towards the beginning of the month, we were invited to a ■ wedding! With none of us having been to a wedding in ■, we spent a lot of the time taking in the culture and enjoying the ceremonies. It was a very long, fun and

exhausting day. And we didn't even stay for the entire wedding. In total, the wedding ceremony was from 7:00 to1:00 and the reception began at 4:00 later that day. It was so interesting to watch their traditions and to be included in such a special day!

January also marks the beginning of a new school year for ■! Between the four of us, my teammates and I have a mixture of new students and new teaching schedules we've been navigating this month. Alyssa and I are teaching consistently every weekday from 1:00–4:00 (three hours a day), but Hannah D. and Britta have ranging schedules from teaching one hour some days of the week and seven hours other days.

One of the positives of our new teaching schedules is that my teammates can now provide pull-out and small group instruction for one another during classes to provide support for students who need extra practice with English or need a refresher on the basics. I've been helping Britta two hours a week in seventh grade providing phonics instruction for her lower students.

We've seen a lot of growth in relationships with our students since beginning teaching this month. Many students eagerly approach us as we arrive at school and give high fives, fist bumps and some hugs!

One of my favorite things to do with my students this school year has been teaching feeling words and their meaning. We have a short "morning meeting" at the start of every class where we discuss feelings, the date, the weather and the time. My students love telling me how they are feeling and asking their peers and other teachers how they are feeling. Once they even asked a gecko how he was feeling.

My teammates and I have also been able to connect with school staff this school year. We've specifically gotten to spend time with one of the sixth grade teachers. A few weeks ago, we all went swimming together at the pool near our home in . It has been very encouraging to see our relationship with this teacher grow!

Lifting Requests:

- Flexibility and sustainable routines as my teammates and I adapt to schedule changes and begin settling into a routine with teaching this school year.
- Establishing appropriate relationships with students: Our students love seeing us and showing/receiving affection, but some students want to show affection in ways that are not appropriate for a student—teacher relationship. My teammates and I want to communicate that we care for our students while also establishing healthy boundaries.
- Growth in our relationship with the sixth grade teacher, that she would see the Father through our interactions and conversations and that He would stir up a desire for Himself in her heart.

(Now have retired but are still serving with Wycliffe Bible Translators)

One time someone told me, "When a person retires they need to sit under a coconut tree in a hammock and sip on Coke all day long"— Naught! Not the retired people we know! God has given us so many opportunities since we retired the end of July.

We returned to Honduras the end of September. Since then Marilyn has led four Healing Groups and three Trauma Healing Trainings. In December she began mentoring four very capable and committed young people to continue on doing Healing Groups here in Honduras in her absence. We have several churches who have requested that we hold one for their congregation so there are many opportunities ahead. It is such a blessing to hear the testimonies of people being healed from so many of their hurts!

Roger continues on doing Bible transla-

tion with language groups in Guinea Bissau by Zoom. One of the groups that he has been working with over the last eight years just completed the translation of the whole New Testament. His next assignment is with a language group called Manjaco and they will be working on the book of Esther.

We now head back to San Antonio for three months. Part of the time we will be visiting churches in the eastern part of the U.S. Roger is flying straight to the U.S. and Marilyn is stopping off in Mexico. She will be holding a Healing Group for Huastec Inidans from February 28 to March 5. It is a large group of one and a half million speakers. There are New Testament translations in the three different dialects of the language. This is the first step toward producing Story Based Trauma Healing in their language. Another couple will help with the Healing Group and then Marilyn will stay on for a few days mentoring the translation team in how to produce the materials in their own language. We are very excited about this new project!
