Broken Strings

I recently ran across the account of a famous violinist who played a concert in one of the great halls of Europe—equivalent to the crowds that a modern rock concert might draw. The story is told of one such night in Paris. As the great violinist appeared on the stage, there was an excited buzz in the audience along with great applause. But as the maestro began to play, a string broke on his exquisite violin. This wasn't something he could hide—it broke with a loud "pop!" What was he going to do?

Well, any concern passed pretty quickly as he picked up the tune on his remaining three strings. Unbelievably, another string snapped, followed moments later by a third string. These kinds of things just don't happen. Now the buzz in the audience was more anxious. Perhaps even closer to disgruntled. These folks paid a steep price for their tickets.

It was right at this moment that the old maestro just raised his hand and called for silence. As the audience became quiet again, he made a simple but enthusiastic announcement: "Ladies and gentlemen, I will give you now a one string concert!" What followed was easily the most amazing musical performance the crowd had ever seen, or would ever see, as the maestro played a rich and flawless melody on one string.

Here's a question to consider: When did the great violinist reveal how great he truly was? Was it when he had all four strings in place and everything was as it should be? Or was it when he had the least to work with—just one string? Here's a second question: When does Jesus, our King and Master, most powerfully demonstrate how much

He can do? Is it when we are at our very best and utilizing all of our skill and ability? Or is it when He has the least to work with—when our strings are broken and we have almost nothing left to give? Might I suggest that this is when God does His greatest work.

The Apostle Paul talks about this very thing in 2 Corinthians 12:7-10. Years earlier, Paul had been given some spiritual revelations that no man had ever experienced before. It was the kind of stuff that makes a resume look really good. In light of this, Paul says, "To keep me from becoming conceited because of these surpassingly great revelations, there was given me a thorn in the flesh...Three times I pleaded with the Lord to take it away from me. But He said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for My power is made perfect in weakness.""

Paul learned, over time, that he experienced God's power the most when he had nothing left to give. He was able to accomplish far more when the strength and ability wasn't coming from him—but from God. It's because of this that Paul could say, "Therefore, I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me...For when I am weak, then I am strong." (v. 10)

There is a basic spiritual principle that is always in effect: The less there is of you, the more there is of God. Understanding this can actually make you (like Paul) embrace your hard times—even your hurting times—with a sense of expectancy instead of dread or discouragement. It's not that we like the pain, but we realize what pain can produce. And all through it, we have God's unbreakable promise, "My grace is sufficient for you."

Our weakness means an opportunity for a display of the Lord's strength and His glory. Our struggles create a space to experience God's ability to heal, to intervene, and to carry us. You might be reading this today feeling like you're down to your very last string. Please know that this is the moment when the Maestro is at His very best. He lovingly holds you in His arms and He says, "Ladies and gentlemen, I will give you now a one string concert!" He's about to play something beautiful, something unforgettable, something amazing through your life.



Celebrating a Legacy

In this issue of *The Messenger* we are privileged to honor Don Burkholder for his 40 years of service in producing this important document. Don has been retired from his profession as a school teacher for many years, but he has now chosen to retire in just one of his areas of service: editing and designing *The Messenger*. KSC is a church built upon a rich history, and as we enter a new day for our newsletter, it is important to look back and remember its roots.

It all started as a discussion at a Sunday School Executive Committee Meeting in 1982. Chairman Don Burkholder suggested that KSC produce a newsletter to provide news and event information to the Sunday school teachers and leaders. One of the members, Treva Lawyer, suggested that in addition to this newsletter, one be written that would be sent to the whole church. With the support of Pastor Paul Baker, a piece of church history was in the making. Don volunteered to organize it. The articles for the first issues were hand-written on notebook paper or typed and then delivered to Garnet Thrush, a church member who owned a

printing business, for the production of the newsletter. The name *The Messenger* was taken from a previous church publication that had been discontinued in 1967. Originally, the newsletter was published four to six times per year until 1992. It then became a monthly publication.

Early on, the booklet was photocopied from paste-ups, and in 1992, Don began producing it on his personal computer. Don's own mother and aunts helped to apply the mailing labels. His wife Mary and many others helped too, some for nearly 25 years. A school teacher, Don often made the post office drop on his lunch hour or during his free period.

In 2009 *The Messenger* entered the digital age. In addition to being available in the lobbies and arriving in the mail to those preferring to receive it that way, we began to email *The Messenger*. At that point we noted that approximately 250 issues, or 315,000 copies, had been printed, collated, stapled, and addressed.

In 2012 we honored Don and Mary for 30 years of faithful service. And now, we have 10 additional years to honor. It is an incredible legacy of service to Christ.

During the COVID-19 shutdown, we were reminded just how vital *The Messenger* is as a printed piece for King Street Church, and it became one of the main ways we communicated with our church family when many were unable to attend in-person.

As the Communications Coordinator here at KSC, I understand more than most what goes into *The Messenger*. Everyone sent Don the pieces – articles, bulleted lists, thank-you notes, events, photos, reports, facts, figures, logos, announcements, updates, and he organized that 1,000 piece jigsaw puzzle into something that made sense, flowed well, fit onto the pages, and looked good. It's hard to work with deadlines, and also challenging to coordinate a large variety of people. Don accomplished all of this, not once, not a dozen times, or 50 times, or even 100 times, but several hundred times over these many years.

We are in a society where the average worker is spending less than 2 years at a job, the average marriage is just 8 years long, and the average attention span is less than 8 seconds long – which is shorter than that of a goldfish – so 40 years of faithful service is nothing short of a treasure.



In 2012 Don was honored for his 30 years of service. Dr. John Beukema said, "The Messenger has been the trusted voice and vehicle of communication for King Street Church. To organize and edit and put into circulation this newsletter month after month is an amazing feat. To do so with excellence for 30 years is extraordinary. Seldom does someone carry out a ministry so well for so long for so little earthly reward."

From Becky Hann: "When I became a staff member of KSC Don made sure I had a good understanding of the teachers and how things ran in the children's Sunday school classes. He and Mary also taught 4th grade Sunday school for a long time. He supported me in my new role of Children's Ministry Director however he could. For that I am extremely grateful. He helped take the lead for the church picnic

which used to be held at Twin Bridge Campground. He has always been a tremendous source of encouragement and help for me over the years. I know many families have been blessed by all the different ministries Don has been and continues to be involved with at King Street Church. I know the Hann family is one of those families. Thank you, Don, for your faithful service!"

Don once told me that he started working on the next *Messenger* the very day after the last ones went out. So over the last 40 years of his life, it hasn't meant a couple of hours here and there, one day a month or something like that. It has been a role that has played into nearly, I would guess, every week of his life in a significant way. And as Dr. John Beukema said in his 2012 comments, "The majority of that time was during your active work life, raising a family, and serving in other ways." I am blessed that I get paid to create things, but Don has given us his time, his art, his creativity, and his heart as an act of worship to God.

It has been an honor and privilege to witness Don's dedication these past 13 years, and to assist him in God's work. Mary's own contribution cannot be discounted. In addition to proof-reading *The Messenger*, she has supported and enabled Don to invest in this time-consuming work.




Attendance Report

OMM Report

from the Once More Ministry Leadership Team

This KSC ministry shares the love of Jesus and builds relationships by providing toiletries to those in need in our community.



You may recall that March's distribution was moved a few weeks due to winter weather. We were excited to see how the Lord would work through OMM for His Kingdom and especially curious to see if the postponement would result in unexpected opportunities for ministry. Although we may not see all the results of His handiwork, we believe that there <u>can</u> be purpose in details like a snow-induced postponement. God is in every detail and we know He has orchestrated OMM's outreach in ways we can't imagine.

March's distribution saw increased attendance early in the day; we ran out of toiletry supplies around 11 a.m. and food supplies from our partners around 11:15 a.m. We've never run out so early in the day! We can only speculate as to reasons for this; one thought is that funds often run low at the end of the month. Whatever the reasons, the Lord allowed OMM to touch a lot of lives we hadn't met previously. Praise God for that!

We are so grateful to our dedicated volunteers who donated supplies, time, and effort to our mission to bless and serve our community with the Gospel. The Lord has been so faithful to send us the right people at the right time, all with hearts to serve our community friends. Thank you, Team, for all you do to help reach our neighbors for Christ! While numbers do not reflect all the ministry that occurs on a distribution day, they may help you to understand the scope of the people we seek to reach.

Our distribution team included:

- 25 volunteers who packed 200 toiletry boxes and 50 bags and loaded them onto the trailer beforehand
- 30 OMM event volunteers, an officer from the Chambersburg Police, and a WellSpan Community Health Worker
- 10 volunteers to write cards to event attenders

In addition to the 250 bags and boxes of toiletries supplied by our church family and our budget through KSC, these individuals and businesses contributed to make the distribution even more plentiful:

- Gene & Fern Diller: 200 boxes
- David H. Martin Excavating: a trailer to store packed boxes and bags
- Ruthie Ludwig & Weis Grocery: 75 reusable grocery bags
- Bender's Potato Farm: 300 ten-pound bags of potatoes
- Maranatha Ministries: pastries, breads, mac & cheese, and potato chips
- Shalom Christian Academy: 2,022 pounds of canned goods
- PA Department of Health: 526 at-home COVID test kits
- Wilson College Community: 800 toothbrushes
- Covenant Family Dentistry/Adamson Family Dentisty, and Wolter Advanced Dental Care: 200 toothbrushes



A huge **THANK YOU** to **Katie Shank**, KSC member and member of The Porch Young Adult ministry who headed up the March distribution as part of an educational leadership project. She oversaw our planning, supply collection, prepacking, and distribution; she

also arranged for Wilson College students to donate toothbrushes for our kiddie bags. It was a massive task, and she did an amazing job!



Our friends traveled from Chambersburg, Mercersburg, Fayetteville, Shippensburg, Mechanicsburg, St. Thomas, Greencastle, and Smithsburg, MD. A total of 268 families, representing 1,068 people, were served, and the languages represented were:

- 96 English (289 family members)
- 115 Spanish (502 family members)
- 56 Haitian/Creole (232 family members)
- 1 Indian (5 family members)

We invite you to partner with us in this important work! We purchase some bulk supplies from the Dollar Tree. Their costs have increased \$.25 per item, and due to the large volume of our orders, our quarterly costs have now risen \$900. The Lord has been faithful in supplying every need; we don't doubt that He will continue in that faithfulness. You may be part of His plan! Would you pray about how you can support OMM? If you would like to donate supplies, it's very affordable through the Dollar Tree or similar retailers. You could



even get creative! Some Sunday school classes support OMM by placing collection tubs in their classrooms. (*Please email us if you decide to do this so we can arrange to collect goods from your classroom.*) We invite your L3, Bible study, or prayer group that would like to take on a service project. We know our readers include some savvy savers and out-of-the-box thinkers. We are so very thankful for each and every donation.

Donated supplies can be placed in the bins at each worship venue. Here are the items we regularly collect. As a reminder, items should be in new, unopened condition.

- Laundry detergent (30-64 oz)
- Dryer sheets
- Feminine hygiene products
- Liquid dish soap
- Toothpaste
- Bar soap
- Razors for men and women
- Shampoo & conditioner
- Deodorant for men and women
- Individually-wrapped paper towels
- Small 4- or 6-packs of toilet paper
- Facial tissues

We provide prayer cards and the plan of salvation in every bag. Our next distribution is on **Saturday**, **June 11**. If you would like to serve with OMM, there are many ways you can do so, before, during, and after the event.

March Board Highlights

The Board of Administration of King Street Church met on Wednesday, March 9, 2022 in the Choir Room. Glenn Watson, Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 7:05pm. Alyssa Heberlig opened the meeting with devotions and prayer.

AUDIT AND COMPLIANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

Glenn Watson welcomed Dave Rotz to the Board Meeting to present the results of the Annual Financial Audit. Dave shared that the committee audited the records of the financial reports of the church for calendar year ending December 31, 2021. They found no evidence of errors or omissions. They wish to commend the Treasurer, Business Manager, staff and volunteers for the fine work done this past year.

SENIOR PASTOR REPORT

Pastor Jody stated that his report is wrapped around three areas: Grieving, Raising Up and Coming Together. Pastor Jody shared that we are still in a season of grieving with the passing of many people close to us. In regards to "Raising Up", Jody shared that he is grateful for the team we have here at KSC. In regards to "Coming Together", we want to see our King Street Church family come together even more than we already are, a place where people can truly feel free to be honest and open, and

know they will be taken care of. May 15 will be a congregation-wide church service and will focus on celebration. Pastor Jody will be wrapping up the Hebrews series by the end of April and then we'll enter into a new series in Ecclesiastes.

EXECUTIVE PASTOR REPORT

Steve Flint shared that the Partnership Class this past Sunday went very well. There were 110 people that attended the Ash Wednesday service. The Maundy Thursday Service will be held at 6:00pm on April 14 in the Sanctuary. The Once More Ministries distribution has been rescheduled for March 26 due to inclement weather. After our All Staff Meeting coming up this Monday, March 14, the entire staff will be doing a "Taco Monday" luncheon. It is being sponsored by an anonymous donor so the staff can fellowship together.

ELDER TEAM REPORT

Greg West advised they are working on plans for improving communication between the elders, co-missions and staff. This includes understanding each other's roles, developing leaderships skills and how the different groups can work more closely together.

ADMINISTRATION REPORT

Dan Gehris shared the cost of the various camps being offered at Rhodes Grove Camp

this summer and proposed a motion that King Street Church contributions remain the same as they were last year. The motion was unanimously approved.

CO-MISSION REPORTS (alpha order)

Adult Ministry – Mark Willson announced two new co-mission members, Ralph Todino and Karen Martin. Mark gave a report on the Night to Shine event and shared appreciation to all those who worked so diligently to make this year's NTS event a great success. The "Roar Like a Mother" conference has over 300 registrations representing over 40 churches. Plans are being made for the library to become more of a multi-faceted environment.

Local Outreach – Sharon Bowers reported that the Franklin County Jail Ministry has great support from both the Warden and Deputy Warden. Fruitbelt

Farmworkers reports a strong receptiveness to the Gospel. Once More Ministries has a distribution scheduled for March 26. Agape English continues to see increases in numbers each week. RESET continues to grow as well.

Missions – Alyssa Heberlig advised that John Schaffer is their new vice-chairperson. John Smith joined their co-mission meeting to share an update on Orphan's Tree. Alyssa stated there is going to be a meeting this spring to discuss plans for Haiti reconstruction.

Personnel Relations – Aaron Smith advised the PRC has been discussing the current open positions (custodial and preschool coordinator). We are in a holding pattern with the potential Spanish speaking pastor role.

Property – Dale Forney shared that there is work being done on a new design for the library and pricing is underway. HVAC building automation has been completed. The Middle School area and hallway work is being discussed. The painting has been completed in the nursery. The co-mission is also discussing a request to add a sink in the Connectability Room.

Student Ministry – Penny Poorman advised the Student Ministry Co-Mission did not meet since our last Board Meeting and had no updates.

Worship Arts – Carolyn Chenaille advised that two college students have applied for the Creative Arts internships. Solotech is still planning for the second week in July for their Baker Center sound system install. Prayer requests include more volunteers for worship at RESET, confidence for student worship leaders, more people to join the Adult Choir and for the worship staff as they discern all the opportunities available and that they would properly pace themselves.

Russia Ministry Update

April 2022, this update is from one of our ministry partners that serves orphan "grads" who have been released from government care and are trying to live on their own.

We are now approaching two months of this unimaginable war. As a ministry and as individual staff members, we feel the ramifications of it in so many ways. However, our Russian staff is committed to continuing our outreach regardless of these most difficult circumstances. Here are some quick updates:

At this time, we are aware of one of our program participants who has been killed during the war. Zhenya was a newer member of our family program in
as he and his wife Oksana had a baby girl this past December. Our staff is supporting and working closely with Oksana as she grieves the loss of her husband. Your prayers for her and the baby are appreciated.

Inflation has started hitting the budgets of our older orphans. The rising cost of food and shortages of medicines are acutely being felt. Meanwhile, the expected drop in the value of the ruble has not been as drastic as predicted as the Russian Central Bank continues to prop up its value.

As you may be aware, many Russians are limited to what their paranoid government tells them

for their knowledge of the war. The vast majority of our orphans fall into this category. Despite the tension and stress, ministry continues! We are providing support for young families, the peer-to-peer mentorship is thriving, life-skill seminars are assisting orphans in their transition to independent living, and staff are sharing the good news of this Easter season. On our last Zoom call with partners, it was announced that the Ministry Center received a Volunteer of the Year award from the city of . Volunteering by orphans continues in all our regions and we are especially pleased with the start of this meaningful activity in .

In closing, a short story. In 1995 I was visiting the ■ Orphanage and was told a lady was waiting outside to meet me. She was probably in her 70's and had that weathered look of someone who had lived a hard life. She wanted to meet an American for the first time and ask questions to confirm some things she had heard. It was a fantastic visit and as she was leaving she said to me, "I remember all the times we were told about how terrible Americans and the West were. But I remember during WWII when Americans sent wheat to Russia and I even received a blanket from Americans. So when I was told by our government how Americans were our enemy, I never believed them."

I share that story from 27 years ago as it appears we are replaying that exact scenario.

The current Russian government is saying the same things and many people believe what they are told. I feel is important that today we consider those we work with, and cover them with "blankets" of love and care. Thank you again for your continued, faithful prayers. ~ G.

- "My face always looks sad. That is just its natural state, and I can't help it."
- "I'm seven right now. When I am nine I will get to wear the hijab!" (Muslim head covering)
- "What is hell like?"

R and her helpers have opportunity to give the children direction, comfort and perhaps most importantly, to establish that we who know Jesus are people of hope and love them. We believe we are planting seeds that the Lord will use in the future. Please pray that long term the children will seek to know Jesus.

In addition, we had the wonderful surprise of meeting an extended family of Syrian refugees who speak Turkish! This family spent 8 years in Turkey while wading through the long stringent process of finding a new country to live in. Already we have had opportunity to share with them our hope in Jesus. The family members who know Turkish best are now starting jobs, so pray for more opportunities to meet with them.

Travel to ■

Lord willing, this month we will travel to meet with our workers who minister there. We are thankful to have this chance to meet with everyone. Five of the twelve fellow workers have arrived in the last two years and are still in that uncomfortable time of adjustment to a new place and culture. Pray that in our time together the workers will be encouraged, renewed and trained in fruitful service. Also, in flying to that region we will need to navigate Covid restrictions that are still in place. We would appreciate your prayers that travel plans will work out smoothly. Our trip is from April 26-May 5.

Ramadan

Today, April 2, the Muslim month of fasting begins. This is not the easiest time to witness as religious fervor is at a high point. Also, many Muslims re-arrange their schedules to sleep during the day, making visits difficult. But this month is a great opportunity for us who know the living God to pray. Ask God to shine the light of the Gospel brightly in the Muslim world, pray that Muslims will be convicted of their sin and their inability to please God through their works and fasting.

Adjusting to the changes has been difficult for our team as a whole, but I can see the Father working in this season through growing our patience with one another and helping us learn how to serve one another better.

Along the lines of teaching, my 6th grade class will soon be starting a unit on daily routines and I would love to involve all of you in this unit through creating a PowerPoint or short



video about a day in your life! This doesn't have to be anything elaborate. Simpler is generally better for my students and their English levels. The KSC church office has an example of what the PPT could look like. They can also put you in touch with me if you're interested in doing this or have any questions.

As some of you may already know, I've committed to a second year of teaching in ■! I and the rest of my teammates (who have also committed to serving in ■ for another year) are so excited to see what the Father will do in the coming year in the life of our team!

A question that often follows my second year commitment is: When will you be visiting the States? A few weeks ago, we received our school schedule for the academic school year and learned our school year will end in November of this year. So, I will be visiting in November and December of this year when my school is on their break.

My 5th graders are so full of energy and excitement! One of the benefits of my teammates and I having different teaching schedules is that we can now serve in one another's classrooms by providing specialized small group instruction for students who need extra interventions in English.

This month, my teammates and I took a weekend to visit the beautiful temples in the city of ■. This trip was a great experience for my teammates and I to learn more about the culture of ■ and experience some of the traditions that people value so highly. Witnessing the grandeur of ■ was a very valuable learning experience and I'm so grateful to have had the opportunity to learn more about the culture of ■ and to have a change of scenery.

The architecture and history of ■ is truly incredible! The ■ people are so proud of ■! Thank you all so much for the Christmas cards! This month I got two packages of Christmas cards from all of you.
