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The Need to Breathe

OK, so I'll admit that I was a fan of this past season of American Idol. I thought the show did a good job of identifying the top three singers who made it into the finals, and I would have "been happy" if any of them had won. However, the singer that I found myself pulling for as things went along was Leah—a twenty-year-old from Normal, Illinois. I just really appreciated her growth as the season unfolded, and loved the clarity in her voice (I won't tell you if she won or not).

Leah was the first to perform in the three hour live finale that concluded by announcing the winner of the entire season. It's really hard to imagine the pressure that these singers were facing. After Leah sang the opening number, Luke Bryan (one of the judges) said something that I found very interesting. He said that minutes earlier, just as he was about to walk out on stage, he saw Leah (backstage, behind the huge stage props)—literally lying on her back on the hard floor. He asked her why she was doing this. And before she could even answer, I knew in my spirit exactly what she would say. Leah was just trying to slow everything down and center herself. She knew that the next three hours were going to be a total blur, and she just needed to catch her breath—which is precisely what she told Luke.

There is something about that situation that really spoke to me.

We ALL have a need to breathe. We all have the deep need, from time to time, to slow everything down and process the speed at which things are happening all around us.

I want you to think with me for a minute about these past couple of years. In March of 2020, we learned that this virus called "Covid-19"

was starting to spread pretty quickly. We didn't know exactly what this might mean, but WE NEVER IN OUR WILDEST IMAGINATIONS BELIEVED THAT IT WOULD QUITE LITERALLY BRING THE ENTIRE WORLD TO A COMPLETE STANDSTILL—BASICALLY OVERNIGHT. It is impossible to overstate how dramatic all of this was. Everything closed. Don't breathe the air. Don't touch anything. Don't go out of your home. A death counter constantly scrolling on the bottom of the TV screen. No toilet paper. The list goes on and on.

And now, twenty-six months later, we know that this virus was and is real. Covid preyed on the medically vulnerable. Thankfully, most of us got pretty sick—but not deathly sick. Not everyone was so fortunate. I am willing to bet that each and every one of us know someone who died, and Covid played at least some sort of a role. My sister died of bone cancer—but she wasn't able to get in to see a doctor for a correct diagnosis for several months because of Covid. My 99-year-old mother basically died of old age—but there is no doubt that Covid took the wind completely out of her sails.

Our world has changed DRAMATICALLY these past twenty-six months. We all know this. But my question is: Have you really taken the time to truly grieve and lament all that has been lost? Have you taken the time to catch your breath and process all of this? We are living in a far more divided world than we ever have before—I said early on in the pandemic that we haven't seen this kind of division in our country since the Civil War. People are taking sides on EVERYTHING. There is no "gracious middle" anymore.

There's a good chance that you're harboring some anger and deep frustration. There's a good chance you have a completely different view of some people than you did just a couple years ago. There's a good chance many of you are lonelier than you've ever been in your entire life. The list goes on and on.

I think many of us need to slow down and do something that the Bible calls lamenting. Lament is actually a form of praise and prayer—with the intent of drawing close to God in times of great suffering and pain. In many ways, lamenting is a wonderful gift to the children of God. The mere fact we are able to approach God in lament is a sign of intimacy and hope! Perhaps the best definition of lamenting is "a prayer of pain that leads to trust." Lament is the wailing of the heart before a God who hears, who listens, and who responds to our cries.

Almost half of the 150 Psalms in the Bible are laments. This should tell us that lamenting is an important part of the human experience. It's not a sign of weakness—it's a sign of trust. We desperately need to express to God our anguish and pain, and then find hope and comfort in the truths of His faithful character and promises.

Instead of charging forward as if everything is OK, I want to encourage you to do something along the lines of what Leah did right before she took the stage on American Idol. Slow down. Catch your breath. And more than that—go before the God of the Universe and pour your heart out to Him. Confess your sin to Him. Admit your anger or frustration. Ask for His healing. Cast all of your cares upon Him, because He truly cares for you.

Celebrating Life Together!

Sunday. May 15, was a beautiful day for our church family to come together as one family of God and celebrate our Savior in one space, at one time, and with one voice. We definitely enjoyed ourselves as approximately 925 gathered in-person and a few hundred more joined us online. As part of the service, three young adults were baptized, and we shared in "United" style worship which means a blend of traditional hymns like "It Is Well" along with more modern songs like "What a Beautiful Name." Pastor Jody shared a story from his own life about how God saved him from death, but he also addressed how we can trust Him in the face of death. The dark clouds parted over Chambersburg and we were bathed in bright sunshine just in time for lunch. What a wonderful day!



April Board Highlights

The Board of Administration of King Street Church met on Wednesday, April 13, 2022 in the Choir Room. Glenn Watson, Chairman of the Board, called the meeting to order at 7:05pm.

SENIOR PASTOR REPORT

Pastor Jody Bowser shared his appreciation for Bekah Laws and her outstanding job of directing the choir. We had a wonderful Palm Sunday celebration with an attendance of 1,080 people. Pastor Jody acknowledged the great job that Camaryn Ellis did a couple of weeks ago from the pulpit. Pastor Jody shared that he had the opportunity and honor to pray at the state capital in Harrisburg at the invitation of PA State Senator Doug Mastriano.

EXECUTIVE PASTOR REPORT

Pastor Steve Flint asked everyone to be in prayer for our Maundy Thursday and Easter services. Pastor Steve distributed the new 2022 KSC Staff Album and asked everyone to remember the staff in their prayers. Pastor Steve also shared the handout about the retirement of Don Burkholder and advised there was a retirement luncheon served on Monday, April 11 to celebrate Don's 40 years of service.

ELDER TEAM REPORT

Greg West advised that the elders met in March and they continued to talk about their role as elders. They spent a lot of time in prayer for the various programs of King Street Church and different people's needs. They are still working on plans for improving communication between the elders, co-missions and staff members.

ADMINISTRATION REPORT

Dan Gehris explained why there is a need for the church to purchase a new server. Dan recommended we accept the proposal he shared from Elect IT Solutions for a new server and all included equipment and licenses. On a Brad Etchberger/Dale Forney motion to approve the purchase of the new server from Elect IT Solutions as proposed by Dan Gehris, the motion was unanimously approved.

CO-MISSION REPORTS (alpha order)

Adult Ministry – Mark Willson advised the "Roar Like a Mother" conference took place with over 40 churches represented. Grief Share has about 24 weekly attendees. The KSC library team continues to work and they are a dedicated, committed group who are passionate about the library. Mark shared that some of our L3 Groups want to explore beyond the DFD curriculum and go deeper in studies. There is a scheduled annual meeting of the L3 leaders in May.

Children's Ministry – Alexander Rosenbaum advised the Children's Ministry Co-Mission plans to meet next month and will continue planning for this year's VBS event.

Finance – Brad Etchberger stated that the next meeting for the Finance Co-Mission is scheduled for April 25. Dan Gehris reviewed March 2022 financials and Q1 2022 financial results. March undesignated giving was under budget but is still over budget YTD. Expenses in March were under budget and are under budget YTD. Dan led the Board in a heartfelt prayer of gratitude to the Lord reminding us all that this is the Lord's ministry and Jesus is working through the generous hearts of KSC.

Local Outreach – Sharon Bowers reported that the LOC met on April 5 and Pastor Adam opened the meeting with devotions and prayer. Bev Sollenberger was welcomed to her first LOC meeting as the newest member. Camaryn Ellis led worship at an Intervarsity event at Wilson College. Pastor Adam reported that RESET is doing well and they have 45-60 people participating each week. Once More Ministries had a distribution two weeks ago and their supplies were depleted by 11:00am.

Missions – Alyssa Heberlig advised the Mission Co-Mission agreed to send three monetary gifts to different organizations that are aiding Ukrainians and the co-mission will revisit this again soon to see what the needs are and possibly give again to relief efforts in the Ukraine.

Personnel Relations – Brian Mace reported the PRC had a meeting on April 6. It was the first PRC meeting since Kim Shatzer's passing and there was a time of remembrance

during their meeting. The part-time Pre-School Coordinator position has no current internal candidates. Aaron Smith has accepted the position of PRC Chairman. Brian Mace has accepted the position of PRC Vice Chairman.

Property – Dale Forney shared the landscaping around the 2nd Street parking lot has been completed. We have requested cost estimates for a sink to be installed in the Connectability Room. The plexiglass sneezeguard installation at Deb's Café has been completed. A white dogwood tree has been planted in front of the church office which was donated by the Disciples Sunday School Class in memory of Earl & Almeta McClain and Bob Mills. All tree trimming has been completed.

Student Ministry – Penny Poorman shared the middle school boys went to see a Hershey Bears hockey game and a group of middle school girls also went to Hershey. Road Crew training was held on March 6. "Serve Saturday" was a huge success. Tonight is the "Night of Peeps" event. Small Group Night is scheduled for April 27 and Senior Celebration is on May 4. The Road Crew picnic is scheduled for May 11. Ten students registered for the upcoming Kentucky Mission Trip. The Chambersburg Project registration is now open and there is an ice-skating event planned for May.

Worship Arts – Carolyn Chenaille shared there were 50 individuals in the mass choir. Carolyn is going to recommend we have a mass choir event quarterly because there was so much interest.

Sharon Bowers closed in prayer at 8:54pm.

Resurrection Sunday

In order to have a resurrection, there



must first be a death. The resurrection of Jesus is glorious on so many levels. But it was only able to happen because He willingly gave His life and chose death, so that we would know life. Those days He spent in the tomb would have been excruciating for His friends and followers; for them in that moment, all hope for their future had been lost, and they were mourning a dear friend, brother, and teacher.



I have never thought this much about Friday and Saturday in my life as I have in the days leading up to Easter. Perhaps because I've never quite related to the heartbreak of

death as I do now. Because we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, we can celebrate the resurrection of those we love who have also died and are now with Him. There is so much

joy and comfort in that reality. But this past Easter Sunday, my heart was heavy. Tears filled my eyes and I felt a sting in my heart as we sang, "for the souls of all who'd come to the Father are restored" in worship that morning. I am so thankful God that my sweet brother is with Him; finally free, finally at peace, and finally confident in the truth that the Lord really does loves him. For me though, on this side of eternity, I still find myself living in some kind of tension. The belief and confidence that my brother is alive simultaneously comes with the reminder that he died and he's not here. One is glorious, and one is unexplainably painful.

My spirit knows the truth and the reality that Ryan is the most alive he's ever been. But my mind can't quite grasp it and my heart is still breaking. There are still some days when the grief hits and I feel like I can't breathe. I was reminded a few days ago of a song I listened to many times in those early weeks after Ryan died,

"I will exalt You, You are my God. My Hiding Place, my Safe Refuge, my Treasure, Lord, You are... Because You're with me, I will not fear."

I know I'm not the only one walking through grief right now. I know some of your stories and the loved ones you've lost in recent weeks, months, and years. It's a hard journey to wrestle and live in the tension of these realities; the in between of this evil age and the next age of complete restoration. You are so brave to

continue to get up each day and take one more step forward. The Lord understands, and He knows our little, finite human minds can't comprehend the mysteries and glories of the resurrection in fullness. This is a good time for us to practice Proverbs 3:5. To trust Him with our whole hearts, not depending on our own understanding. My prayer for you, on the good days and the days when you can't hardly breathe, is that you would experience the presence of the God who promises that He is near to the brokenhearted. We have now been back in the US for 2 months. Recently, we returned from a trip to Idaho, Pennsylvania, Michigan and Maryland on our "Thank You" tour. On the trip, God gave us several experiences that could only come from Him!

Among the churches, was one in Annapolis. The pastors and a church member had invited us to accompany them to the Museum of the Bible in Washington D.C. and they had everything set up ahead of time. We didn't expect the surprise that awaited us. Soon after we arrived, they directed us to a large circular room where all the modern translations of the world are exhibited - from floor to ceiling and all around the room. Half of the room contains translations of Bibles or New Testaments that are in existence in other languages and the other half contains empty cartridges representing those translations that are still lacking.

A team from the museum arrived and removed the Mixtepec Zapotec translation from its cartridge and also the Garifuna Bible and let Roger hold them and then even sign each book!

It was an incredibly special moment as we realized that the Lord had permitted us to be part of two of the hundreds of translations that exist. Roger sat in a wheelchair in that large room soaking it all in. I, Marilyn, felt strong emotions as I saw the names of translations that our colleagues supervised. I could see the faces of both Indian and missionary translators who had helped to make it happen. It represents many years of hard work and sacrifice.

A few days later we started the return trip to San Antonio. We were to leave from Baltimore early afternoon but once on board we were asked to deplane. We were to fly to Houston where we had a connecting flight but there was bad weather there. Four hours later the plane was finally able to take off. But, by the time we got to Houston, there were no connecting flights to San Antonio. By then it was midnight. They offered us another flight but not until the next evening. Through a special circumstance we were able to get an airline voucher for a hotel so we headed outside to wait for a shuttle but it never appeared. Roger sat in a wheelchair waiting.

Finally, a man in an unmarked van, who had been there for quite awhile, came to us and said, "I will take you." As soon as we entered the van Roger asked where he was from and he responded, "Senegal." We proceeded to tell him how we stopped over in Senegal on our trips to Guinea Bissau and the places that we had visited in that country. We mentioned the town of "Zhiguinchor" and he responded: "That is where my wife is from!" He asked what we did in Africa and we told him about our missionary work. When we tried to tip him for the trip he said: "No way. You help my people." When we left the car he gave us a big hug. The amazing thing is that 95% of the people in Senegal are Muslim. God sent us a special angel.

When we entered the hotel they quickly informed us there were no rooms. There was a young couple with a baby in the same predicament and Roger walked up to the mom and asked if he could pray for them. We were then sent to another hotel. By then it was 3 am! At the second hotel we were told that our voucher would not be honored. When we heard the price we decided to return to the airport and sat down to wait for the shuttle. The mother of the baby came over to us and said, "We just paid for your room! You prayed a blessing over my baby and we decided to bless you." God sent a second angel. God is so awesome!
