The Way of Love

I don't want to get too "heavy" in these monthly Messenger articles. Having said that, I do want to help us think biblically—and encourage us to live in a way that Scripture calls us to live. And to be clear, what the Bible calls us to do is very often not what our culture is telling us—or not what our emotions are telling us—or even at times not what makes sense to us.

Look no further than the "Sermon on the Mount" in Matthew chapters 5-7. In these three chapters, Jesus makes statement after statement that COMPLETELY goes against the grain of what our world is telling us we ought to do. For example...what should you do if someone treats you in a way that seems unfair? What if they speak to you in demeaning ways? What if someone looks down on you in complete arrogance, and expects you to do things that they ought to be doing for themselves? What if someone literally strikes you or physically assaults you? My goodness—how we ought to respond to these things is a no brainer, right?! Strike back. Get even. Rise up. Take things into your own hands.

But that's not what Jesus said. In Matthew 5:38-42 we read: "You have heard that it was said, 'Eye for eye, and tooth for tooth.' But I tell you, do not resist an evil person. If anyone slaps you on the right cheek, turn to them the other cheek also. And if anyone wants to sue you and take your shirt, hand over your coat as well. If anyone forces you to go one mile, go with them two miles. Give to the one who asks you, and do not turn away from the one who wants to borrow from you." Jesus goes on in the next few verses to tell us to LOVE our enemies, and

actually PRAY for those who persecute (or behave in ways that we don't agree with).

I mentioned a moment ago that I don't want to get too "heavy." That's true—but there is something that I believe we would do well to think about. About 170 years ago, back in the middle 1800's, a man named Karl Marx (joined by Friedrich Engels) wrote some books that outlined a new way of thinking. The super simplified version of his philosophy (now called Marxism) was that we can no longer be happy with just THINKING about the many inequalities in our world, we have to TRANSFORM them. He divided the world into two groups—the owners (he called them the "bourgeoisie"), and the workers (which he called the "proletariat"). He made clear in this worldview that the only possible solution to whatever inequalities that existed (think "haves" and "have-nots") was for the have-nots (the workers) to create as much chaos as possible (riots, uprisings, revolutions, etc.) to eventually OVERTHROW the "haves" (the owners, wealthy, those in power, etc.). You create chaos, you lead a revolution, and then completely overthrow those in power. There is no middle ground—no understanding—no submitting to those in authority.

I don't think I'm overstating it to say that the 1900's were a century dominated globally by Marxist worldview (think communism). Places like Russia, China, North Korea and Cambodia underwent communist revolutions (based on Marxist beliefs) that directly resulted in the deaths of over 100 million people (No kidding. Let that sink in.) When the Soviet Union fell back in 1991, it was widely viewed that Marxism as a predominant way of thinking

died with it. Sadly, that's not what happened. But instead of "attaching" itself to economic groupings (the owners and the workers; the haves and the have-nots), Marxism attached itself to other ways of grouping people (such as race, skin color, gender, sexual orientation, religious beliefs, etc.). The ultimate goal of Marxism remains the same: chaos, revolution, overthrow.

Why do I take this brief "deep dive" into Marxism? First of all, I believe that these are things we need to be aware of and think about. The Marxist worldview is all around us—and we can't just bury our heads in the sand and ignore it. But the more important reason I want to shed light on these things is because they COMPLETELY GO AGAINST THE WAY THAT JESUS CALLS US TO LIVE.

There are many things in this world that don't make sense to us. The world is full of situations that just don't seem right (which is precisely the point of our current sermon series in Ecclesiastes). The question is—how are we to respond? Are we to strike back, get even, rise up and take things into our own hands? No.

Jesus was crystal clear regarding our response. He told us not to be surprised if the world hates us because of our faith and Christ-like life (1 John 3:13). The prophets were misunderstood, hated, and many lost their lives. Jesus was misunderstood, hated, and lost His life. As we abide in Christ (live our lives in love with Him), the fruit of God's Spirit—kindness, patience, mercy, joy, love—will be obvious in how we think and respond. Our lives will shine like stars in the midst of a dark and angry world—and Jesus will be all the more attractive.

May Board Highlights

The Board of Administration of King Street Church met on Wednesday, May 11, 2022 in the Choir Room. Glenn Watson, Chairman of the Board of Administration, called the meeting to order at 7:03pm.

SENIOR PASTOR REPORT

Pastor Jody discussed spiritual gifts and that one of our goals is to make disciples so that everyone knows who they are in Christ, what their spiritual gifts are and how they're living them out. Pastor Jody's next Table Talk event is scheduled for May 12. This Sunday is our outdoor unified service. On Memorial Day weekend, during our worship services, we will pause to lament and acknowledge all the losses we have suffered recently and over these past couple of years.

EXECUTIVE PASTOR REPORT

Pastor Steve shared there will be 3 baptisms this Sunday at the outdoor unified service. Pastor Steve continues to update job descriptions and various policies/procedures. Pastor Steve will be leading the staff through Strengths Finder 2.0 which will help continue to build a strong, Christ-centered team culture to accomplish what God wants us to do here at KSC.

ADMINISTRATION REPORT

Dan Gehris provided an update on the new server that the Board approved last Board Meeting. Dan shared that we worked through Dell (rather than Elect IT) and that Dell customized a new server for \$2,000 less than what we were quoted from Elect IT.

CO-MISSION REPORTS (alpha order)

Adult Ministry – Mark Willson shared that Adult Ministries continued their efforts to connect with L3 leaders individually and they are in preparation for hosting L3 leaders next Wednesday. We hope that our church will encourage all L3 groups that haven't already taken the spiritual gifts assessment to go ahead and complete it.

Children's Ministry – Alexander Rosenbaum shared that VBS is scheduled for June 26-29 and is based on the theme, "Discovery on Adventure Island". Alexander shared that recommitment emails went out to ask if volunteers will sign up for another year

ask if volunteers will sign up for another year to teach. The After School Program came to an end a couple of weeks ago and the Wednesday night activities have also ended for the summer. The Preschool Coordinator position is still open.

Finance – Brad Etchberger reported the Finance Co-Mission met on April 25 and the discussion revolved mainly around the giving budget. Dan Gehris gave a financial report regarding April 2022 and 2022 YTD figures. Dan shared that he will begin reporting on worship service attendance figures. In-person worship attendance is currently averaging 883 this year. Dan shared that we did miss meeting our undesignated giving budget in April. Undesignated giving YTD is still over budget. Expenses in April and YTD are under budget.

Missions – Alyssa Heberlig shared the Haiti Barnabas Team discussed opportunities for increasing sponsorships of students at the Arcahaie school. The team desires to communicate with our KSC family to raise awareness regarding these needed sponsorships. The Reflections Sunday School class is hosting a visit from a missionary with MAF (Mission Aviation Fellowship), on Friday, June 17 at 6:00pm. Alyssa also shared Roger and Marilyn Reeck remain very active after their official retirement at the end of 2021.

Personnel Relations – Aaron Smith reported the 2nd shift custodial position and the preschool coordinator position are both still open. Dates are being considered to schedule the next manager training session and Pastor Steve is working on completing the update of all job descriptions. The Staff Picnic will be held on Wednesday, August 17.

Property – Dale Dale Forney advised that the Building Automation VPN has been put in

place and is working well. Courtyard paver replacement is on-going. Tree trimming and fertilizing has been completed by Cumberland Valley Tree Service. Dale distributed a proposed "Duties of Décor Committee" document as a formal policy and procedure to facilitate any changes, redesign or enhancements inside the church.

Student Ministry – Penny Poorman shared we had 3 student ministry baptisms this year. We are planning events over the summer break like ice skating, park hang-outs, bonfires and open gyms. Last week we held our Senior Celebration. We are looking forward to our annual Summer Sneak beach trip scheduled for June 14-18, the Chambersburg Project is scheduled for July 10-15 and the Kentucky Mission Trip is scheduled for July 17-23. We are also excited to welcome our Prime Intern, Xavier Schell, from Huntington University.

Worship Arts – Carolyn Chenaille advised both the bell choir and the kids' choir have wrapped up and are taking a break for the summer. The adult choir will finish up on Sunday, May 22. Student Worship is also finishing up and there is a real need for more student musicians. We are excited to welcome Blake Rhoades and Anna Schaffer to the Media & Production Team for the summer. The rest of the installation of the new Baker Center audio system has been postponed until August due to shipping delays.

OMM Report

From the Once More Ministry Leadership Team

Our latest distribution took place on June 11. While we had to contend with a little rain, we're so thankful that it didn't dampen the warm and bright smiles of our friends and neighbors! What a blessing it was to be able to connect with them again! The Lord's presence was in every detail as always, and we're so thankful for His providence.

This distribution met the needs of 250 families, representing 946 people and several language groups. Families came from Chambersburg, Biglerville, Waynesboro, Shippensburg, Scotland, Fayetteville, Greencastle, and Mechanicsburg.

We would like to thank our very dedicated **volunteers**, without whom the day would not have been possible! The Lord blesses us every distribution with very servant-hearted and unselfish individuals who love to connect with and serve our community, and we are so thankful to Him and to them!

- Three young ladies from the 6th Grade Street Group assembled and taped boxes and pre-packed toiletry bags.
- OMM packers prepacked toiletry boxes and volunteers from The Porch loaded them into the box truck in preparation for Saturday's distribution.
- On Saturday, volunteers from Maranatha Food Pantry and OMM distributed 250 boxes and bags of toiletries, 300 boxes of food, and 300 five-pound bags of potatoes.

A shout-out to the following **businesses and individuals** who donated supplies.

- Maranatha Ministries: In addition to a box truck to store the prepacked boxes, they also provided 300 food boxes containing fresh produce, boxed and canned food items, and candy bars.
- Bender's Potato Farm: 300 five-pound bags of potatoes

- Ruthie Ludwig and Dollar Tree: 50 reusable grocery bags
- KSC Church and Congregation: 250 boxes of toiletries

Cornerstone Ministries Executive Director, Danneck Faylina, provided us with these program updates from his team's work in the Salima area.

The After-School Program which has been in existence since 2013 for students from grades 4-7 currently enrolls over 200 students. Through tutoring, many students who were once labeled as failures have shown great improvement with the majority successfully moving onto the next grade level. Parents continually share with Danneck how the program is literally changing the lives of their children. Recently, Mr. Tionge Matangula, After School Program Director, introduced lessons on coping with mental health issues due to an increase in youth suicide along with drug and alcohol abuse over the past two years. This rise is in direct correlation to the









COVID pandemic. The introduction of this initiative has helped stem the tide of hopelessness among the youth of their community. They ask for us to pray for the success of this program and for the energy and resources to touch as many lives as possible.

In addition to their focus on academic and behavioral issues, Cornerstone continues to provide nutritious meals for the students for the After School Program, (200+) and the High School (300). Many of the students come from extremely poor families who cannot afford to provide for their children, and King Street Church has been a key supporter for this program. The availability of food has not only helped the students achieve better grades, but has reduced the stress and anxiety levels of parents who worry constantly about feeding their children. The effects of COVID were multiplied by the impact of two strong cyclones







which has affected crop production in addition to destroying homes. Cornerstone has begun operating a Farm/Sustainability Program and had hoped to harvest a lot of maize and soy beans, but the cyclones drastically reduced the yield and food insecurity has once again become an issue. Thanks to the continued generous support of the KSC congregation, the Missions Co-Mission was able to send a gift of \$5,000 in late May, so that Cornerstone could find other sources of maize to feed the children before prices became too high. On a positive note, Cornerstones' goat raising venture has been successful. They have 60 healthy goats on their farm and they continue to multiply. These animals will be used to provide meat for the students, supplementing their diet of maize.

Cornerstone High School has begun construction of a dormitory for girls. Many girls, due to the demands of home and the cultural emphasis and pressure of them to marry and start families at a young age, have only sporadic school attendance. Having the girls stay on campus helps reduce the cultural and family pressures, allowing them to focus on their studies. They also participate in the Girls Empowerment Program, giving them a positive view for their future in their village and in Malawi. They hope to open the dormitory in September of this year and ask

prayers for the students, staff and for a speedy completion of the project.

Danneck writes: "I would like to thank God for His faithfulness towards His people and all the achievements registered since the beginning of the year. In a world where everything is not certain, we are always assured of His faithfulness, love and grace in spite of so many challenges standing in our way. We are so thankful to God that through your prayers and support we are able to see the light of hope."

The Send

I also drove out to Kansas City, MO, for about week to go to the Send. Some of you may remember the stadium gathering in Orlando I was part of a

The Send happened on a Saturday at Arrowhead Stadium where tens of thousands of people gathered. It's all about activating and mobilizing every believer into their missional calling. People are encouraged to engage in their neighborhoods, in high schools, colleges, through foster care & adoption, or going to the nations.

Writing & Curating Content

Since officially joining Frontier Alliance International in January, it was a bit of a slow start in figuring out how/where I could serve. June 2022, teaching English overseas in ■, a country we cannot disclose.

A common theme in my own life this month has been relationships. As I continue to spend time with my students, teammates, and people in the community, I can see how valuable relationships are in feeling like a part of the community here and opening doors for conversations beyond the typical small talk. Today, I want to share with you a few stories and conversations that have happened in the past few months.

During a break between classes, one of my students was looking at the ranking sheet for her class. Our school ranks students every month based on their exam scores and posts the ranking in the front of the class. My student pointed to the highest ranked student and told me he is good at studying. Then, she found her name on the ranking sheet and expressed her disappointment in not having a high ranking, claiming she is not good at studying. This provided an opportunity for me to reassure her by telling her she is a good student, she works hard, and that every student is valuable no matter what their ranking is. Culturally, this isn't something students hear often, and I'm so grateful to have a place in my students' lives where the Father can speak through me and use my interaction to share how He sees each student no matter their academic performance.

Another instance where I've had the opportunity to share the love of the Father with my students is through hosting them at lunchtime. They are very curious about my life and home and will often come over at lunchtime to visit. After creating a plan for child safety, my teammates and I are now able to open our home and host students. This new level of openness can help us to know students on a more personal level and show that we care about them as people outside of the classroom setting.

The growth of these relationships extends into the community as well. One weekend, my teammate and I went to a nearby drink stand to get bubble tea like we often do, and we were able to have some great conversations with the owner of the stand. In the past, we've exchanged casual greetings and had a few short conversations, but never anything this in-depth. This time at the stand, we were able to talk more deeply with the owner about our respective families, work and different beliefs. We shared our beliefs as best we could with our limited ■, and we learned more about what this woman's values and beliefs are. This conversation has helped us to grow closer to this woman, develop a deeper relationship with her, and it has opened doors to deeper conversations in the future.

These three events are so encouraging to me as I see the progress that is happening in ■, and I hope they are encouraging to you as well! The Father is working in this country, and I'm so grateful that all of us are able to play a role in seeing His work unfold. Whether spreading the good news locally or internationally, lifting, or giving support, each of us has a very important and necessary part to play in the work of the Father. For this reason, I want to thank each of you for your support over these past several months. Without you, I wouldn't be able to share these stories of how the Father is working.

Update from Haiti

From Rodney Mose, on behalf of the KSC Haiti Barnabas team:

On August 14, it will be one year since an earthquake rocked the southwest region of Haiti. The Haiti UB Conference has 4 churches in that region and 253 of those families experienced minor to severe damage to their homes. This event could not have come at a more difficult time for our Haitian friends, as the country has been going through tremendous political and security issues, plus it continues to be a major challenge just to support their families.

We are pleased to share that 80 homes have been repaired, and the third group of 40

homes is nearly completed. KSC is providing funds to repair 10 homes in each of the 4 UB Church congregations at a time. Once a group of 40 homes is repaired and verified, we request funds from the Missions Co-Mission to repair another group. There are still 133 homes to be repaired, in addition to repairing damages to three of the four churches. However, the Haitian Pastors feel that the first priority is to take care of the families.

From Pastor Supreme:

Greetings all,

This is Pastor Supreme speaking, first of all I want to bring greetings to all my KSC brothers and sisters, I am so delighted to write this letter on behalf of the UB southern communities to let you know how appreciative we are to have been able to repair many of our homes that were destroyed by the quake last August.

I know you all dream of the day that it will be possible again to be in Haiti with all your Haitian sisters and brothers, we too want the same thing therefore we pray that the Lord will bring political stability here so that you all can come and continue to work while providing the word of God to the Haitian community.

On 14th August of last year an earthquake struck the southern part of the country and left many in grief as a significant number of homes were wiped out, our UB communities were greatly affected by the disaster, my country which is already being eaten alive by a chronic political crisis was not prepared to deal with a catastrophe such as an earthquake.
