Raising My Ebenezer

What do you know about the word *ebenezer*? I've always thought of it as such an old-fashioned word.

I believe I first heard the word *ebenezer* used in three different contexts when I was a child (way back in the '70's). My father was a Baptist pastor in Columbus, Ohio—and there were times my parents and I would visit other churches in the city. Sometimes my Dad would be called on to preach at a different church, or there would be a city-wide gathering. I can distinctly remember going to a church called Ebenezer Baptist Church in the inner-city of Columbus—and thinking that it just seemed like such an odd name for a church.

The second place that I remember hearing the word *ebenezer* was in the story "A Christmas Carol" by Charles Dickens. Ebenezer Scrooge was the lead character in the story—and he wasn't a very nice guy. His name became synonymous with being a mean old miser (even though he experiences a transformation at the end of the story). And the third place I remember the word *ebenezer* was when we would sing the hymn "Come Thou Fount" in church. The beginning of the second verse starts, "Here I raise my Ebenezer, Here by Thy great help I've come." I had no idea what I was singing about. I just found it to be a very odd and old-fashioned word... which in some ways was quite legitimate when you consider the fact that that hymn was written by a man named Robert Robinson in 1758. (I suppose that qualifies as old-fashioned!)

THOUGHTS FROM PASTOR JODY


There are times, though, when old-fashioned things—when we truly understand them—carry a much deeper and richer meaning. That is most certainly true about the term *ebenezer*.

The word actually originates in the Bible...the Book of 1 Samuel, chapters four through seven. The nation of Israel has been battling it out with the nation of the Philistines (a common narrative throughout much of the Old Testament). At one point, the Israelites grew so desperate that they took the Ark of the Covenant out of the tabernacle, and carried it onto the front lines of battle—basically as a "good luck charm." This didn't go well. God doesn't work that way...as if we're somehow in control of what He has to do. The Philistines wound up defeating the Israelites in that particular battle, and taking the Ark back to their own pagan temple. God, in turn, sent a series of plagues on the Philistines (there was an outbreak of "tumors"—causing panic to fall upon them).

Finally, the Israelites sought the help of Samuel the prophet—who in turn pleaded with God to help them. There was a repentant spirit amongst the people, with most Israelites putting away their idols and crying directly to the Lord for help. Samuel offered up sacrifices, which in turn led to God "thundering with a loud thunder against the Philistines and throwing them into such a panic that they were routed before the Israelites." (1 Samuel 7:10)

It is at this point that Samuel does something very significant in response to the deliverance the Lord had provided: "Then Samuel took a stone and set it up between Mizpah and Shen


(two small towns). He named it Ebenezer, saying 'Thus far the Lord has helped us.'" (1 Samuel 7:12) This explains why the word *ebenezer* literally means "stone of help." From that day on, whenever an Israelite would walk past that stone, it would remind them of the fact that God had rescued them and been their deliverer.



I find it very interesting that in Matthew 21:42, Jesus identifies Himself as "the stone that the builders rejected." We don't have a big rock that sits out in a field that was placed there by Samuel the prophet. What we DO have is Jesus, who was raised up on a cross for our sin—and who by dying on that

cross defeated death and Satan, and has completely delivered us from all of our sin and failure. Jesus Himself is our *ebenezer*. Jesus is our stone of remembrance. Jesus is the reason that we have victory and deliverance and hope.

I want to encourage you that whatever struggle you might be facing today...
Jesus is greater. He is more than able to give us the victory. We need to do precisely what the Israelites did, which is to put away our idols and cry out the Lord for help. We need to believe that God can truly help us—and call to mind the many times in the past when He has been there to pull us through. And ultimately, we need to put our eyes on Jesus who is our one and only true stone of help.

Building a Community for Young Adults

On a Sunday in 2020, a young woman walked into King Street Church for the first time. She was alone and looking for Christ-focused community. She met Bria Zook, a member of our worship team, in one of the lobbies. The visitor asked Bria if we offered a class or group for young adults. We did not offer anything for young adults. That young lady spent a

morning with us, but as far as we know, did not return.

(This was during the same time that the cconvos were happening) On that day a seed was planted... a hope that we could offer more for young adults like the visitor. In the next year a few possible ideas were considered, and in March 2020 – yes, just days before the COVID-induced shutdown – a new young adult Sunday School class was planned. That was put on hold during the pandemic, and ultimately never materialized. But a deeper conversation continued between three of our own young adults. (continued on next page)

FOCUS ON THE PORCH



In the fall of 2020 the team of four began to meet with Pastor Jay Brown to develop a plan: Bryton Zook, Bria Zook, Lauren Dukehart, and Austin Rosenbaum.

Lauren says, "When young adults leave the education system there is really a lack

of community that they were used to the last four years, whether that is high school or college. In most church instances, there really isn't a place for them to go where they are in a similar life stage."

For college students, the change may also include moving home from another state, and the adjustment is even more jarring. This is a season when there are expectations to pursue your dreams, make life-altering choices, and navigate new jobs and relationships. The pressure is intense, and it can be difficult to maintain one's faith in the middle of it.

Bryton says, "The Porch is important because I have seen, over the years, the gap in church ministry for young adults in between graduating high school and starting a family of their own."

Together, the grouip planned and prayed about developing a ministry for Young Adults called The Porch. Three core values emerged that go hand in hand with KSC's core values:

- 1. Being an open and inviting community of faith through relational connectedness.
- 2. Being rooted in God the Father's Word in the Bible, the Gospel of Jesus Christ, as we learn, grow, and pray to be spiritually alive through the power of the Holy Spirit.
- 3. Being missionally engaged as we serve the local community and the church together as disciples of Jesus.

In the spring of 2021, they launched The Porch. The first gathering was planned for May 20.

Bryton remembers that Pastor Jay cautioned the team to keep their expectations low for their initial attendance because it can be very challenging to begin a new ministry. He encouraged them that even 10 participants would be a success.

"I knew it was a long shot but I still felt like 25 people was a realistic expectation," Bryton admits. "And then the first night came, and 29 people came out, and it was really exciting!"

It wasn't a fluke either. The fellowship continued to grow. Now, more than a year later, is not uncommon for 30-40 young adults to attend their meetings. It was clear that there was a desire for this type of connection.

Lauren notes that about half of their meetings are filled with a dedicated core group, and about half is a constantly fluctuating crowd. She says, "It's exciting to get to meet so many different people and see so many different faces, and to know that there is a hunger for community."

MISSION

The Porch Young Adult Ministry exists to gather young adults to connect, support, and challenge one another. We come from different backgrounds and life experiences, but what we share is a desire to build authentic community and grow in our faith and affection for Jesus Christ (Phil. 2:1-11).

GATHERINGS

We meet on the 1st and 3rd Thursdays of each month in the Student Ministry Center from 7-9:00 pm. At these gatherings, we seek to build relationships, share life together, and gain practical and applicable insight from God's Word to apply to our lives. Small groups meet on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of each month.

COMMUNITY

We also have opportunities to build deeper community in gender-specific discipleship groups on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month. In addition to community, the main focus of these groups is to dig into God's Word and study other Bible-centered books and devotionals that will help us to become more equipped disciples of Jesus Christ!

SERVING

We present opportunities for young adults to volunteer their time in Jesus' name. Here are some ways to SERVE: volunteer at KSC, in the local community, and international missions. Also, we will hold serving events throughout the year that are great opportunities to be the hands and feet of Christ in the local community, build relationships, and sharpen our focus on seeing God's Kingdom active and growing in the world.

FOCUS ON THE PORCH

Bryton says, "It's been encouraging that other local young adults have also had this desire of faith community. I was a small group leader with one group of guys from 6th grade through graduation. And now it's great to see those guys come to The Porch and stay connected through the summer and when they're home from college. I am now excited to see the fruits of this ministry being able to fill the gap that we recognized."

While they play games, enjoy snacks, and have plenty of time to talk, the leadership team have been committed to keeping Christ central. They have pursued biblically-focused studies. These have included Mental Wellness, a series on Adulting, and the Book of James (from Right Now Media.)

A series on worship culminated with an amazing night of worship together. Don Baker presented one message on sanctification, and a very popular series was one on how to build healthy relationships. For one of the messages in that series, the team invited three couples connected to KSC to share about their own experiences.

Lauren says, "It was special for everyone to see the different perspectives of the three couples and to hear that they have had struggles as well as seasons of blessing."

The Porch has hosted several recreational activities, including volleyball at Norlo Park, mini golf at Cluggy's, a few game and trivia nights, a fall party and Christmas party, and worship and testimony outreach.

Their serving opportunities have been just as well-attended. They gardened at NETwork Ministries, and have regularly hauled supplies to prepare for Once More Ministry distributions.

A notable event was when The Porch teamed up with InterVarsity at Wilson College to offer a worship night. One of the leaders of InterVarsity – Emma Lowman – attends both KSC and The













Porch, and she was looking to create a night that would bolster their weekly group. A night of worship with a live band would draw in more students. The night ended up being a great success.

Most recently, The Porch took a team to landscape at Monarch's Way. This ministry to young women is flipping a home that they will sell to raise money for their work. The Porch hoped to make a dent in the landscaping needs, but they ended up completely transforming the grounds.

Just last month, the Porch began small groups on the second and fourth weeks of the month. These groups grew out of increased hunger for relationship. The leaders for the small groups have come from within The Porch family.

Lauren says, "It's nice as a leader to be able to participate and give others an opportunity to step into a leadership role."

Pastor Jay says, "From the front-row seat that I've had in seeing The Porch ministry develop, it has been an encouraging privilege to see how God is bringing young adults together to love each other and seek His glory. The leadership

team has been amazing in how they have worked together and created an environment that welcomes everyone and puts them on a path to greater discipleship. We have needed this for a long time - and it's wonderful to see how God is building it and using it!"

The Porch is a glowing example of God at work through King Street Church. This is not just because they are growing or impacting our community in the name of Jesus. It's also because the ministry has come about because four young adults responded to a need within our body of Christ, and they sacrificially dedicated themselves to meeting that need. They saw a gap, they stepped up, and they filled it.


UB Women's Conference

Celebrating 25 Years with Becky Hann

On August 11, Becky Hann celebrated 25 years of ministry here at King Street Church as Director of Children's Ministries. We couldn't let this milestone pass without letting Becky know how much we appreciate her investment in our Crosswalk Kid's Ministry. We are not just speaking about an investment of time or resources, but of her heart and her passion for Jesus.

Becky and Paul began attending in 1987 when they moved to Chambersburg. Becky says she began serving almost immediately. She sang in the choir and served in the nursery and preschool areas.

When asked why she took on the role of Director of Children's Ministries, Becky describes understanding the responsibility of influencing our next generation. "And I'm going to blame the rest of it on Ron Cook!" she jokes.

At the time, **Ron Cook**, Minister of Pastoral Care, was our Director of Christian Education, and his oversight included children and adult ministries. He helped to recruit volunteers. By his own admission, he saw promise in the young mother.

Ron says, "She had begun to work with kids at the time, and I saw that she was gifted in working with children. I asked her to consider leadership on Wednesday nights."

Ron explains that he knew Becky's father, who was a pastor and evangelist. He describes a time when he spoke at a Rhodes Grove annual camp meeting, and six young men committed their lives to Christ for full-time Christian ministry. "He just had a great personality, and a heart for people, and that flowed over into Becky."

The church was growing and Pastor Pat Jones felt that there should be someone assigned to oversee children. Ron encouraged Becky to pursue the leadership opportunity, and in 1997, Becky became our first full-time Director of Children's Ministries.

Becky says, "I'm grateful that the church gave a mom of three kids the opportunity to do ministry here for all these years. To be honest I never imagined I'd be here for this long!"

Marsha Spangler remembers in those early years that Becky's youngest child, Nathan, would come to work with her and sleep under her desk if the day went long. Now that little boy is our Pastor of Contemporary Worship.

Nathan says, "I am so thankful and proud of my mom. Twenty-five years is a long time to be in ministry these days especially at one church. The kids ministry has grown and so has her leadership responsibility but it's never been about those things for her. It's always been about introducing kids to Jesus and helping them to forever follow Him. It's been about equipping teachers to raise the next generation, praying with families, showing up early and staying late. It's been about crafts, lessons and providing groceries to families in need. Her heart for the Lord and the humility in which she works is such a blessing. God has used her to make deep and lasting impact into kids and families. It's a gift watching her live out her calling."

Jeanie Helman, Children's Ministry Outreach Coordinator, shares: "I have served with Becky for over 23 years. What a blessing. I knew when I met her and started working with her as a volunteer that she was someone I would have a special relationship with and I have not been disappointed. I am grateful to her for supporting me, helping me and pushing me to be a better leader. She has my back and lets me know when I need to do better. She has been a blessing to me over the years, yes... but more importantly to the children and families we minister to. She makes herself available to others, no matter how busy she is. She has a clear vision for the ministry we do and cares deeply for the spiritual development of children. We are blessed to have her as a boss, a friend, a leader, coworker and sister-in-Christ. I pray God's richest blessings upon Becky! I am grateful to her for helping me be a better leader and for not giving up on me!"

Lisa Todino, Nursery Coordinator, says, "I have so much respect for Becky! She's taught me so much in the years I've been fortunate to work with her. She is a model of integrity, wisdom and faith. She is so real and genuine and our families and her staff are so blessed to have her! She is a welcoming face in our hallways Sunday mornings and her knowledge of all things kid min is vast. Becky is always striving to improve and keep things fresh as we move forward."

Steve Flint, Executive Pastor, shares, "There are a number of traits I appreciate about Becky but the one I appreciate the most is how she prays! She puts her whole heart into her prayers and I know she is praying for the needs all around her. I praise God for her prayerful leadership!"

As Becky reflects on her time at King Street, she thinks of our leadership.

"For me, the one thing that I'm most grateful for is the support that the church has given to me and the children's department," she says. "It's so encouraging. Whenever the ministry has needed something, I have asked and they've done their best to accommodate me."

Becky continues, "There have been challenging seasons over the years, but on the other side of those times, I've been able to see how good and faithful that God has been."

When asked about the highlight of her time at King Street, Becky is thoughtful, and then explains, "For me, it still amazes me that every Sunday, we have anywhere from 50-60 people showing up — and these are volunteers, people who aren't getting paid to do this — but they choose to get up on a Sunday morning so that they share the Gospel with kids. It blows my mind that they are here at 9:15, ready to serve and love on our children. I never take that for granted. The joy that they demonstrate is a joy for me. Seeing their faithfulness, *that* is my highlight."



Haiti Sponsorship Program

A new school year will begin next week in Haiti and I thought it would be good to bring to you a greeting from Pastor Massillon, and update on the Child Sponsorship Program.

When KSC began the Sponsorship Program in January 2014, the school had 150 students. KSC began working with CH Global to begin a Child Sponsorship Program and KSC families sponsored 102 children. The school was located in very primitive facilities, with grades kindergarten through 6th grades. Pastor Massillon acknowledges that without those sponsorship commitments the school would have closed.

Since then a new church and school buildings have been built and classes are now offered for kindergarten through 11th grades. Next year there are plans to add the 12th grade. So as we think about the ratio of sponsored children in 2014 we sponsored 102 out of 150 total students. Now here in 2022, we are sponsoring just 92 of the 365 total students. It causes us to ask the question, would there be families at KSC who may be interested in sponsoring a child in Haiti?

Prior to this current time of unrest, the Haiti Barnabas Team conducted yearly teacher training seminars to enhance quality of teaching. The King Street Missions Co-Mission continues to support a school meal program. The combination of these elements of support has increased the quality of education at the Arcahaie School. (These photos show Rodney and Pastor Jody during visits to Haiti.)

The Haiti Barnabas Team, with the support of Pastor Jody, has invited Pastor Mark Wallace



to visit KSC on September 18 to talk about our partnership with Christian Horizons Global and their ministries. Mark is the Executive Director of International Partnerships for CH Global and a United Brethren Pastor.



KSC has worked with Mark since 2013 when we began the work in Haiti.

We ask that the KSC congregation continue to pray for our partners in Haiti. Our Haitian friends have always stated that the key for Haiti's future is education, and that starts with the children. Since the Sponsorship Program is a major source of funding for the school, on September 18 the Haiti Barnabas Team would like to offer the opportunity to sponsor a child to anyone who feels led to do so.

We also learned that there is no way we can prepare as we'd like for every curve ball a year will throw at us. The unexpected will undoubtedly come and try as we ought, we cannot anticipate or avoid it. But hope is not lost. Perhaps one of the greatest gifts the Lord gave us in 2020 was exposing the sandy hills we mistook for solid foundations. In His kindness the Lord is re-establishing our foundations and ripping every false comfort and idol out of our hearts so that we can stand firm and sure in the days ahead.

Honoring Joy Dawson

I first heard Joy Dawson's name when I joined YWAM at 18. We heard about her within a few days as we learned about her teaching on prayer and intercession. It ignited my heart for prayer; I had never heard anything like it. It was easy for me to look at Joy's life and her fierce commitment to holiness and fear of Lord and think, "That's a bit extreme, I don't have to take it that far." Maybe it will never get recognized by people. But that's okay, I'd rather receive a reward from the Lord than from man. I'd much rather be entrusted with more in the Kingdom. This perspective shift is so freeing!

Russia Ministry Update

from John Smith, Orphan's Tree

It's a hard time to be an American mission organization doing work in Russia! Many, if not most, American missions had pulled out of Russia during the pandemic or after the invasion of Ukraine. Orphan's Tree, faithfully supported by King Street Church, continues to minister in Russia. Even during the pandemic, when travel to Russia was not possible, people asked us why we didn't expand our ministry to older orphans to other countries since Russia was "closed." Our answer then, as now, was simple: "We've been called to Russia."

It's been three years since American teams have been able to travel to Russia to minister to older orphans with our Russian staff, prevented first by the global pandemic, then by the invasion of Ukraine. King Street Church had sent three teams to Russia before the pandemic (see photos), and we continue to relate to both staff and orphans through Zoom and Telegram.





What has amazed us (but why should a work of God's faithfulness still surprise us?) is that our Russian staff (35 Russians, most under the age of 40) have not only continued our ministry to older orphans, but expanded it during this time! Older orphans (aged 16-30) in Russia are both afraid and confused with all the social turmoil resulting from the invasion of Ukraine. They need the peace and confidence given by the Gospel now more than ever.

We are asking for prayer in three areas for our continued Russian Ministry:

- Marie Safety and security of our staff. There is much anti-American propaganda in the Russian media because of our support of Ukraine. We pray that our staff, who have been known to work with Americans, are not prejudiced against. Current condition: Praise God We have not had any issues or fears raised by our Russian staff members. Continue to pray that this will be the case as being long-time friends of Americans is a risk to them during these days.
- Electronic communication. Zoom, FaceTime, or Text is the lifeline of our ministry to our staff and orphans during this time. There have been some efforts to cut off communication to individuals and organizations outside of Russia. We need to keep communicating with our people there. Current situation: Praise God, we are able to continue having Zoom calls, emails with attachments, and texting. Our ability to communicate with our staff has gone unimpeded so far.
- Transfer of funds. Our ministry has been funded by churches, businesses, and

individuals in Russia as well as the United States. However, the current financial situation in Russia has decreased the giving ability of those who have supported us, making American support even more important. We feared that the sanctions imposed by western countries would keep us from being able to support our staff and help our orphans. Current Situation: Praise God, in early April the U.S. Treasury Department issued a memorandum that groups providing humanitarian assistance could transfer money to Russia. It took jumping through some hoops, but we continue to fund operations and activities on a monthly basis.

Please continue to pray for our staff and for the orphans they minister to on a daily basis at our four Ministry Centers, located in Vladimir, Ivanovo, Kostroma, and Kirov. And pray that one day soon the door will be opened for us to travel once again to minister to and with our Russian staff, offering orphans practical help and God's hope through Christ.
