Chosen, Gifted, Sent.

Over the Christmas break, I watched the first few episodes of season 3 of "The Chosen" with my family. If you've not yet watched this series—I highly recommend it. Dallas Jenkins and the other producers have created such a fresh and deeply insightful look into the life and ministry of Jesus brought to life from the pages of the four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John). I find each episode deeply touching.

The most recent episodes have focused on the sending out of the twelve disciples as we read about in Matthew chapter 10. This moment in the life of the disciples was pivotal—and most certainly frightening and overwhelming for them. Up to this point, Jesus had called these men to be His DISCIPLES. This meant that their primary "job" was to follow Jesus. Wherever Jesus went, they would follow behind Him. They were the students—Jesus was the teacher. He was the one calling all the shots, and the disciples were simply responsible to do what they were told and go where Jesus went.

In Matthew chapter 10, however, there is a significant shift. These men go from being Jesus' DISCIPLES—to being sent out as His APOSTLES. This is a game changer in so many ways. It is one thing to be a student. It's another thing entirely to be the one who is responsible to teach the class. It's one thing to follow Jesus in the posture of a disciple. Apostles, however, are "sent out" (the definition of an apostle) to do the work themselves.

THOUGHTS FROM PASTOR JODY

I really appreciated how "The Chosen" captured the look on the faces of these men when Jesus called them to be apostles. You could sense that they fully understood what this meant. You could almost feel them thinking: "Wait a minute! I didn't sign up for this! I joined this group to be with Jesus when He overthrew the Roman government and established a new kingdom!" But you could also sense their excitement in being teamed up with a partner (Jesus sent them out in twos), and going in the power of the Holy Spirit ("Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse those who have leprosy, drive out demons").

It's impossible not to make the connection to each one of us. Jesus didn't call us just to be "students" our entire lives—people who sit back and fill our notebooks with words and our minds with information. Jesus called us to "go and make disciples of all nations—baptizing them and teaching them to obey" (Matthew 28). Each of us is saved to serve. We are commissioned to go and live the call. We are chosen, gifted and sent. And the most amazing part is that we do this together—as the body of Christ—and in the power of the Holy Spirit. It is a great responsibility, and an even greater joy!

Celebrating Deb Weaver and 42 Years of Service

For over four decades at King Street Church, when students in grades 6-12 arrive for ministry on Wednesday nights, they've been greeted with a hot, nutritious meal. They have gathered around green bean casserole, baked mac-n-cheese, and other homemade favorites because of the vision and hard work of one person: Deb Weaver.

For 42 years this faithful woman has served tirelessly behind-the-scenes with our students. She will soon be moving out of the area to live with her daughter. We can't let her go without honoring her great legacy of service.

When asked how she got involved with Student Ministry, Deb laughs and says, "That's easy! My daughter Shari and her friend Todd talked me into helping. They were in 8th grade

and the current [volunteer] leaders needed help." Her first role was a kind of "relationship person" — she interacted with the kids and spent time with them.

Deb describes that at one point she had an international student living with her and it was challenging to make dinner for him in between work and Wednesday night ministry. "I told him, 'I'm just going to have to cook your dinner at the church.' That's how my cooking on Wednesday nights got started. This was back in the old kitchen, before the Baker Center, and there was an old iron stove. I was afraid of that thing. Rodney Mose and Rodney Smith both helped me. I told them, 'When you guys get the stove going without blowing it up, let me know!' "She laughs at the memory. "The meals just took off from there; some of the other ladies helped and soon we were cooking for everyone."

"That became my thing," Deb says. "Food. That seemed to be what the Lord wanted me to do."

She describes that one night a young kid came up and said, "I just want to thank you for the cooked food, because it's probably the only evening meal I'll have this week." She thought, "Oh my goodness, how many more kids do we have like this?"

Deb explains, "We had kids coming in for Wednesday nights off the street. We didn't know too much about their home lives. I prayed, 'Lord, we can't let kids go without food.'"

Deb admits that she wasn't a polished cook when she began, but that she learned more and more recipes out of necessity. She learned to be resourceful and "it just worked."

Deb describes how she was part of the team that first dreamed of the retreat that is now known as Winter Slam. At their peak they fed 500 people. In the summers they took the students to Creation (a pre-cursor event to Summer Sneak).

"Wanda Dice and I went shopping and did the cooking together. It was a learning experience — cooking chicken outside. I'll never forget it! Wanda and I still laugh about it! But it was for the kids. We did everything for them."

Over the years they developed an impressive system at Creation. "Oh we had the neatest setup, a really organized campsite. People would come and take pictures. We had generators, and even a shower. So many people helped."

She says that when Brian Kramer and Mark Vincenti were pastors in Student Ministries, they

added events like the Senior Celebration. She also made cookies for a special fundraiser. "Any time I asked for help, people stepped up. My Sunday School class helped and many others; it was the adults joining together to care for the kids."

At every point in the story Deb pauses to list off the names of others who were involved: Jeff & Judy Stouffer, Blair & Shirley Clark, Marlene Garland, Ruth Kirkpatrick, John & Carol Dice, Jim Washabaugh, and many others. She grieves that she can't remember them all.

Suzanne Piper, who has worked with Deb, describes that Deb took personal ownership of the kitchen. She stopped by every week to check inventory, stock supplies, take home rags to wash, and even provided her own utensils so that the kitchen functioned at an optimal level. Suzanne says, "She treated the café like her own home."

Deb planned her menus from a small book of handwritten recipes, where her careful notes recorded exact quantities of ingredients and reminded her which dishes were most popular. She made sure that kids who could use extra food took leftovers.

Dylan Chenaille, a junior at The Street, says, "Ever since I started in sixth grade, every single week we've had a meal— amazing, full-blown meals. I don't really know that a lot of people think about where they come from. She provides meals for students who don't get them at home."

Dylan adds, "I've mowed her lawn for 8 years. She always gave me something for my work. She has given me <u>many</u> amazing things: my first job and money that helped me to buy my first car. She is just an incredible woman."

Dylan thinks that the delicious meals have drawn in some students who might not otherwise attend. Then they get the opportunity to hear the Gospel. In this way, Deb's impact goes beyond the valuable aspect of creating community.

He says, "A meal might seem like a little thing but her amazing mac and cheese is known throughout the whole student ministry. Plenty of people get excited when they smell the mac and cheese!"

Nora Lowman, a senior, says, "I think that Miss Deb has made a really big impact. In all of my years of middle and high school she has always made sure that there is something delicious for the students to eat; even when her own health was an obstacle she didn't miss a beat. Often she does not take enough credit for all of the work that she does. Her gift of service through food has blessed thousands of students!"

Suzanne Piper describes that one year, Deb's mother suffered a stroke and she couldn't cook for

the senior celebration. Suzanne volunteered to take over. She says, "It was probably 20 hours of shopping, preparation, cooking, organizing, and setting up just for that one event. It was a mammoth task! And Deb did it year after year after year. She would always express her sincere appreciation to those who came to help, and passed on all the praise to them, never accepting any accolades for herself."

Suzanne adds, "She is one of the purest people I know, and has a tremendous sense of service, but in a very humble way. It's been incredible. She is benevolent, caring, and has the biggest heart for others. She doesn't want any thanks. She extends gratefulness to others for what they do, even when she has put in 90% of the work."

Deb admits she wasn't thrilled to hear about this article, as she didn't want the attention, "I told God, put me in the background. That's where I want to be, just making sure things get done."

She remembers that when the new kitchen was installed in the Student Ministry Center, she was surprised and dismayed to see that the sign read "Deb's Café." She asked for the sign to be remade without her name and pastors Brian and Mark refused, "We knew you'd object, but the sign stays," Brian insisted, eager to acknowledge her role.

In fact, Brian Kramer, Pastor of Student Ministries from 1995-2012, says this about Deb: "It's impossible to estimate the thousands of lives Deb has touched. She has loved students through hospitality and infused the entire team of adults with focus. And she did it all through a physical struggle that was hard for any of us to understand. She clings tightly to Jesus in a way that has benefited the world around her."

John Shadle, who was a student from 1996-2003 and Pastor of Middle School Student Ministries from 2013-2020 shares: "If there was a picture next to the word 'servant', it would be a picture of Deb. Thousands of students have been impacted by her showing and providing a significant need for them."

In describing her own experience, Deb says, "It was an adventure. It really was. Things didn't always go perfect, but we did the best we could. Taking care of kids— it was important. It was really a great time, and I'm just so thankful to have been part of it."

We are thankful for <u>you</u>, dear sister, and humbled by your dedication to God and His people. *Well done* and blessings on this next season of life.

Welcome Alyssa Heberlig



On November 14, Alyssa Heberlig joined the King Street Church staff as Agape English Ministries Resident. We sat down with Alyssa shortly after she stepped into the role to learn a little more about her.

"I understood what it felt like"

Alyssa's interest in languages began in West Africa in 2012. She was a missionary with Eastern Mennonite Missions, and spent most of her time assimilating into the culture so that she could be involved in discipleship and service. The locals spoke almost no English and Alyssa found she could barely get around. She recognized the great value of language to accomplish the basics of life: to get groceries, make friends, and manage public transportation. Alyssa was blessed to know another missionary family who invested time every day to train her in the culture and teach her vocabulary. She found their help to be invaluable.

Alyssa had attended KSC before going to West Africa, and she continued worshiping here when she returned. She found she had compassion for those who were learning English as a second language and was intrigued when she heard about Agape English Ministry.

At the time, Agape was conducting a single Saturday night class to teach English to anyone who wanted to learn. While the group began small, they quickly grew. Sue Marshall, an early leader and now the Agape Coordinator, assured volunteers that a love for people was more important than teaching experience. Alyssa joined the team.

She says, "I understood what it felt like to be confused or anxious. Empathy really helped me to move toward Agape. I had a real connection with the people."

While staying very involved in Agape, Alyssa also joined the Missions Co-Mission, where she has served for over 6 years. She explains, "International missions remains very important to me."

"My love for AGAPE motivated me"

At the beginning of 2022, Alyssa decided to move away from her career in finance and pursue a degree in education. She is now studying English Language Arts and English as a Second Language.

While she did not know exactly where she would land in the education world, Alyssa says, "My love for my time with Agape motivated me to want to do this full-time. Learning more about the community, myself, and my strengths all motivated me to change my career field. But I wasn't sure where it would lead."

Alyssa's desires and God's direction have been in perfect sync with important needs at Agape. The ministry has been rapidly expanding over the last several years. We now serve members of the community during the week as well as Saturday night. Our Bible studies are becoming more popular. The need for more teachers and support staff was becoming increasingly urgent.

The week we wrote this article, 138 people in our community walked into our ministry center to ask for help in learning English. They are 138 unique people with different backgrounds, stories, physical needs, family situations, levels of wounding and spiritual beliefs. We provide them with teaching. compassion, friendship, and practical cultural

advice, right along with Bible verses, Christian songs and opportunities to learn more about Jesus. This is a vision that Alyssa embraces.

When she speaks about the adults who attend Agape, Alyssa radiates with a passion for people. And when the part-time residency opportunity at KSC became available, she was energized.

"I knew immediately I wanted to pursue it," she says. "I'm very excited to continue investing in King Street Church and our community at the same time."

Adam Keath, Director of Restoration and Recovery, will provide oversight to Alyssa's residency. He says, "Alyssa's heart to serve our local immigrant community is so clear in speaking with her and watching her serve. I'm really grateful for the opportunity we have to help support her goals of teaching and loving this community while we gain so much from her gifts and experience."

Her role will include focusing on teaching and lesson planning for classes that meet on Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday. She is also involved in volunteer recruitment, equipping, and retention. It's a big job, but Alyssa is ready to dig in.

"I enjoy serving the international community in my hometown," she says. "It's important for me to stay connected to people from all over the world, and I can do that right here in Chambersburg."

We're grateful for you, Alyssa, and your energy to help lead the charge in engaging and blessing our community with the Gospel!

I will graduate in April from Huntington University with a double major in Youth Ministry and Christian Ministries. After that, I will hopefully find a church and be able to serve as their youth pastor!

October Board Highlights

The Board of Administration of King Street Church met Wednesday, October 12, 2022 in the Large Conference Room in the KSC Administration Building. Glenn Watson, Chairman of the Board of Administration, called the meeting to order at 7:00pm. Mark Willson opened the meeting in prayer.

Glenn Watson advised that on October 5, 2022 a request was put forth to send \$5,000 for disaster relief to Samaritan's Purse as a response to the devastation experienced by the Florida coast caused from Hurricane Ian. The email vote was unanimously approved.

Glenn Watson advised the Project Priority Team met on September 29, 2022 and distributed a copy of the Project Priority List to each Board member. Glenn Watson gave details for each of the items listed, the costs associated with each project and the approximate timeline for completion. The motion to approve the Capital Project Priority List was approved unanimously.

SENIOR PASTOR REPORT

Pastor Jody shared that Lunch Lessons (formerly known as "Table Talk") is going very well.

Operation Christmas Child is being kicked off this Sunday, October 16. We have a goal of giving 2,000 filled OCC boxes this year. On Sunday, October 30, we will celebrate "Family Sunday" with a focus on the families of King Street Church. Pastor Jody quoted passages from

his April, June, July and October Messenger articles about living our lives in a way to give access to lost people to know who Jesus is.

EXECUTIVE PASTOR REPORT

Pastor Steve shared that he is grateful for the 9 new partners of KSC that will be introduced on October 23. Pastor Steve appreciates Aaron Smith and the PRC for allowing him to host Bill and Heidi Dittmar for the Strength Finder Training. He looks forward to helping each staff member implement what they learned about blending their strengths with their spiritual gifts and using the training with those they work with and in all their relationships.

ELDERS TEAM REPORT

Greg West advised the elders are resuming a former practice in spending more time shepherding the entire staff. This gives each staff member an opportunity to communicate with an elder, express their opinions on things and to ask for support and prayer.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

Dan Gehris advised that he wanted to go over the co-mission roster needs for 2023 with each chairperson this evening. The co-mission chairs shared the number of spots needing to be filled on their co-mission for the 2023 calendar year. Nomination Committee members will be Ken Adams, Andrea Adams, Steve Flint and Greg West. Dan advised that all budget proposals have been received.

CO-MISSION REPORTS (alpha order)

Adult Ministry – Mark Willson advised that the Adult Ministry Co-Mission is working on a way for people to identify their spiritual gifts within their L3 Group. For those L3 Groups who have completed the DFD studies, there are books recommended by Pastor Jay. The Adult Ministry Co-Mission will host the Spring L3 Group Leaders Meeting.

Children's Ministry – Alexander Rosenbaum reported back on a previous inquiry regarding Children's Ministry attendance; pre-Covid as compared to now. In February 2020, at both 9:30 and 11:00 am, the attendance was in the low 200's and now, the weekly average is between 170-180.

Finance – Brad Etchberger reported the Finance Co-Mission will meet on Tuesday, October 18 to discuss the 2023 Budget which will then be presented to the Board of Administration on Wednesday, November 9. Brad shared that the comission's goal is to balance the overall church budget over the next two years. Dan Gehris shared his financial update including September 2022 financial results and 2022 YTD figures.

Local Outreach – Sharon Bowers shared that Sharon Roberts is the new vice-chairperson of the Local Outreach Co-Mission. The next LOC Quarterly Meeting with all LOC ministry partners is scheduled for November. Sharon shared that the LOC was very grateful to receive a bequest earlier this year and the LOC decided to give several financial gifts to local ministry partners as a result.

Missions – Alyssa Heberlig thanked the church for its generosity in support of missions and advised that additional funds were sent to Haiti in support of their continuing recovery. Last Tuesday, the founder of "Rays of Hope" in Malawi visited with some members of the Mission Co-Mission and the Barnabas Team. We will be hosting George Steiner, President of Orphan's Tree, on Sunday, October 30. Orphan's Tree is one of our partner ministries in Russia.

Personnel Relations – Aaron Smith shared that the staff Christmas Party will be held on December 8. We are still recruiting for the 1st shift custodial position. Aaron shared that Becky Hann reported they are managing without the Preschool Coordinator position being filled by utilizing volunteers. The PRC has approved an Associate Opinion Survey. Aaron presented a motion regarding a part-time residency position in conjunction with our Agape English Ministry. The motion was approved unanimously.

Property – Dale Forney shared that the second floor hallway renovations in the Children's Department will resume in November. Work is progressing with the Ministry Center renovations. The design for the courtyard paver replacement project was approved with the pavers to be laid in the shape of a cross. The middle school and hallway restoration project is scheduled to be completed by the end of October and includes installation of wood trim, the sound booth, countertops and five cabinets.

Student Ministry – Nathan Rosenberger shared that on Saturday, September 24, KSC hosted the National Day of Volunteer Youth Leader Training. The All-Nighter Event is scheduled for October 28. Small group nights were held on September 5 and October 2. There are plans to hold a Serve Saturday event in November and the Students' Christmas Party is scheduled for December 7.

Worship Arts – Carolyn Chenaille shared the Night of Worship was a great success. Carolyn also shared with the Board that we had some equipment failure on Sunday, October 2. The failure was regarding the broadcast/playback of the sermon message from one venue to the other and the need to replace the component that is used to accomplish that process.

Mark Willson closed the meeting by asking all to join him in reciting the Lord's prayer at 9:23pm.

BOARD HIGHLIGHTS CONTINUED

November Board Highlights

The Board of Administration of King Street Church met Wednesday, November 9, 2022 in the Fellowship Room of King Street Church. Glenn Watson, Chairman of the Board of Administration, called the meeting to order at 7:02pm. Andrea Adams opened the meeting with devotions and prayer.

SENIOR PASTOR REPORT

Pastor Jody began his report by announcing he has a new granddaughter, Evelyn Jane. We are currently involved in three church-wide initiatives: Operation Christmas Child, 2000 Tables and the Generosity Project. Pastor Jody shared the participation of Family Sunday with 11 baptisms, 5 children dedicated and over 1,000 in attendance. Pastor Jody shared that we are so privileged to be involved in so many lives with our mission to "engage and bless our community with the gospel."

EXECUTIVE PASTOR REPORT

Pastor Steve reported on the baptisms of young children and the child dedications plus the privilege of reading the names of those who have passed and gone on to be with the Lord these past 12 months. The Hymn Sing was attended with about 40 people in the sanctuary and more attending online. Pastor Steve was happy to announce Alyssa Herberlig accepted the position of Agape English Ministries Residency.

ELDERS TEAM REPORT

Greg West advised the elders began work on their 2023 Initiative, a focus on communication. This includes emphasis on improving communication between themselves, staff/pastors, co-missions and the Board of Administration. They are beginning the process with the elders and staff and will be working on this initiative throughout 2023.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

Dan Gehris thanked everyone for the comission descriptions as they were due today. Dan shared that he will be presenting the 2023 pastoral housing allowances and the 2023 financial resolutions for approval at the next Board of Administration meeting on December 14.

CO-MISSION REPORTS (alpha order)

Adult Ministry – Tim Sherald reported the Adult Ministry Co-Mission held a meeting with the Adult Ministry leaders on Wednesday, October 19. Updates from Pastor Jay Brown included the Fall Leaders' meetings that are scheduled for November 20 and 29. The Porch ministry continues to have strong attendance and they are forming their own discipleship program. ConnectABILITY has consistent attendance and is engaging several special needs families on various issues.

Children's Ministry – Cheronda

Williams reported the Children's Ministry Co-Mission is already discussing VBS for 2023. The children's ministry distributed 550 bookbags this year to families. The co-mission discussed having a Parent Conference Weekend sometime next year. The Christmas event is scheduled for December 1 for children in grades 3-5 and the theme is "How the Grinch Found Christmas." The co-mission also discussed a possible new curriculum from Wonder Ink.

Finance – Brad Etchberger shared that the Finance Co-Mission met and reviewed the 2023 Budget proposal. Dan Gehris handed out and explained the budget documents that

he shared with the board members. Dan explained the increases and decreases in the proposed 2023 Budget as listed in the handout. Brad made a motion that the Finance Co-Mission recommends the Board of Administration approve the proposed 2023 Budget. The motion was approved by the Board.

Local Outreach – Sharon Roberts shared that Once More Ministries is addressing a huge need in our community. However, only 20% of the OMM items distributed is coming from the bins/boxes placed throughout the church and the other 80% is being purchased by KSC. Sharon also reported that the Ministry Partners met on Saturday, November 1. The 2023 Night to Shine event will be on February 10. Registration has already reached capacity (130 special needs participants) but we still need volunteers.

Missions – Alyssa Heberlig shared that we continue to support hurricane recovery and rebuilding efforts in Haiti. We have been supporting Hannah Black as she serves in Cambodia and she is back home for a visit. Glenn Watson thanked Alyssa for serving as Chairperson of the Missions Co-Mission and wished her well in her new position in the Agape English Ministries Residency program. John Schaffer has agreed to assume the chairperson responsibilities for the next few months.

Personnel Relations – Aaron Smith shared an update on the Associate Opinion Survey and reviewed the results/responses of the survey. Aaron shared that 29 employees completed the survey. Aaron will meet with Pastor Steve to discuss the survey results, then meet with the department managers and then the staff as a whole. Once that process is completed, Aaron's goal is to discuss the broad overview of the results with the Board of Administration at our next Board Meeting in December.

Property – Dale Forney advised the 2nd floor hallway carpet project in the Children's Department is scheduled to restart in January 2023 after the Middle School project is completed. Repairs and upgrades to our fire alarm system were completed on November 3. The middle school space and hallway project is scheduled to be completed by end of 2022. The Property Co-Mission has received and reviewed the latest update to the Security Plan and will be scheduling a review with the staff.

Student Ministry – Nathan Rosenberger advised the "All Nighter" event was well attended and went great. The Small Group Night took place on Wednesday, November 2. Serve Saturday will take place on November 19. Worship Night is planned for November 30 for the high school students and the middle school students are going to a Hershey Bears game on December 4. The Christmas Party for students is scheduled for December 7 and the Road Crew Christmas Party is December 14.

Worship Arts – Carolyn Chenaille advised the Christmas recording is scheduled for the weekend of November 18 and the mass choir is singing on November 19. Our Christmas Concert will be on December 11. Christmas at Country Creek is scheduled for Tuesday, December 13 and we are planning just one service for Sunday, December 25 (Christmas Day). A motion to approve the network upgrade project was approved with a unanimous vote.

Andrea Adams closed the meeting in prayer at 9:14 pm.



OMM Update

Happy 2023 from Once More Ministries! We held the last distribution of 2022 on Saturday, December 10. It was a cold day but a great many people from our community stopped by for a little extra help to make ends meet. We saw an increase in traffic for this distribution over third quarter 2022 as well as December 2021.

Our Volunteers and Partners

Without our dedicated volunteers and friends—who donate supplies, time, and effort—none of this would be possible. Thank you, friends, for your faithfulness and love for our community! We are so blessed to have you by our side!

In addition to the 250 bags and boxes of toiletries supplied by King Street and our congregation, the following individuals and businesses contributed supplies to make December's distribution plentiful:

 - 300 boxes of fruits/vegetables: carrots, celery, sweet potatoes, and apples

The Numbers

- On Thursday, 12/8, 19 OMM packers prepared 200 toiletry boxes and 50 bags, and 6 Porch Ministry volunteers loaded them onto trucks for Saturday's distribution.
- On Saturday, 12/10, from 9:00 11:00 a.m., 17 OMM volunteers and 6 Maranatha Food Pantry volunteers, as well as a bilingual Chambersburg Police Officer, distributed toiletries and food to over 275 families, which translated to 1,083 people reached!

The People

We continue to see increasing need in our community. The last few quarters, vehicles have lined up in the church parking lot an hour in advance of opening time. Normally, we see a break in traffic about an hour in, allowing us to catch our breath and grab a drink or snack; in December the flow never stopped until after we ran out of supplies! Since there was no break in traffic, we ran out of both toiletries and food around 11:00 a.m., well ahead of our goal to stay open until noon. Besides Chambersburg, families also came from Fayetteville, St. Thomas, and Shippensburg. Here are the numbers:



December 2022, from Namikango Mission

Annual Namikango Staff Retreat

Thirty-nine members of the Namikango staff – including Clinic operations, Ntonda Primary School, Ministry leaders and Junior staff – were in attendance. The retreat was a large success. Planting a New Congregation

Some of our staff team traveled to Central Malawi for evangelism. God led us in planting a new congregation in the Ntcheu District, located in the central region of Malawi.



Namikango worked together with local brethren in the district to preach the Gospel in villages where no active church was present. After a few days of working together, several gladly received the invitation of the Gospel and were baptized into Christ.

Each year when Cindee and I celebrate Christmas with our children and their families, I have a word that I share and some thoughts as related to the Christmas story. This year the word was BLESSED. As we pause to think about the environment that our Haitian friends are living in, we are surely BLESSED! However, we can also celebrate that 160 homes in Haiti have been repaired, and the initial funds have been sent to begin to repair two of the three churches damaged during the earthquake.

The Haiti Reconstruction Committee also recommended that we send \$12,500.00 to Mission of Grace toward repairing their school in the Les Caye region, and those funds have been sent! *



Les Caye, Haiti As we look forward into 2023, there are 65 more homes and the 3 churches to be repaired. I ask for your prayers as we continue to navigate through the process of completing the repairs from the earthquake, and that Haiti is spared of any natural disasters for years to come! The KSC congregation has generously provided the funds to complete this work, PRAISE GOD!

I want to thank each of you for your prayers and support during this past year, and I want to thank you for your prayers and support for our Haitian friends. I spoke with Mark today and he echoed the same thoughts. He also shared that he heard on the Canadian radio that the UN and Canada are discussing how to intervene in the political crisis in Haiti to stabilize the government and bring some level of peace to that country, perhaps with some support from the US. He and I both stated that we can not wait until the day comes that we can visit our Haitian brothers!

I pray that 2023 will be a much more peaceful year both in Haiti and for us, in the US. I ask that you continue to keep Haiti in your prayers, and that we continue to pray for guidance regarding the role of our KSC Barnabas Team in that work. Cindee and I wish each of you health and a BLESSED 2023!
