Whether you are wired for all-nighters powered by gallons of Mountain Dew, or you find the idea of eating an anchovy filled Peep so repulsive that you wouldn't step foot in the Student Ministry Center, we can all agree on one thing: students are the future of the church.

That kid who is running around the halls of the church causing a commotion today will be the pastor of a church who God uses to cause life-change tomorrow. This is the exciting part of ministry and specifically why I love *student* ministry.

When we learned that Pastor Matt was called to Ohio to launch a church, Lauren Dukehart and I took time to step back and reassess the whole of what we do with our students. What has been working well? What might we be able to fine-tune? How can we better build

When Matt came into my office to tell me that he was accepting a call to Ohio, I knew that we did not need to search for a replacement. God, in His wisdom, had already prepared a way for us to continue Student Ministry and thrive. Years before He placed Lauren on our team for just this time. With her gifting and the added benefit of her already knowing where I need support, I felt that God was leading that she be promoted to a full-time role.

Lauren has already been serving as part of the launch team and the lay leadership of The Porch Young Adult Ministry, and this personal passion will also serve our new vision in a powerful way.

In my time here at KSC, I have desired a greater connection between our Middle School and High School areas of ministry. I believe a continuum of care is critical in all church ministry. With Lauren's new role, we will be able to provide a continuum of

care that goes from Middle School <u>all the way</u> through Young Adult Ministry!

Students will now come into 6th grade and build relationships with their leaders as well as Lauren and myself. As they progress into High School, it will be a seamless progression without disruption. The transition from Middle School to High School can be a challenging one, but our students won't have to spend time getting to know a new pastor. In-stead they will benefit from a consistent, stable foundation with the same leadership they know. When they graduate, it will be another easy transition to The Porch Young Adult Ministry with Lauren leading that as well.

Lauren and I are so excited about the future of not only the Student Ministry area, but King Street Church as a whole. We have the most talented volunteer team that I have ever seen in my 12 years of ministry. They trust our leadership, speak into our ministry, and have ownership and buy-in to what God is doing with and through our students. From facilities, who clean up my egg game messes, to our kitchen crew who feed 150 people every Wednesday, to our leaders who give freely of themselves and their time to pour into your students, we have the tools and leaders in place to really take Student Ministry to another level. Pray for us during this time of transition that we will hear from God and the excitement that we feel will be caught by the students!

FAREWELL TO MATT GISH

It was June of 2011 when Matt Gish came to King Street, replacing Mark Vincenti and forming a team with Brian "BK" Kramer. They were big shoes to fill, but Matt proved he was more than capable of taking on the role. A year later, when BK moved away, Matt took full leadership of Student Ministries. It was a position that he expected to hold for a long time.

"I expected a life-long career in Student Ministry," Matt explains, but then the Holy Spirit worked on his heart. "Over the past few years, God has given me more of a passion and care for the broader church, while still loving students."

Matt responded to this holy discontent, and found himself led to a larger church with multiple locations. This congregation is just about to start a new campus, and Matt will be the pastor there. His main role will be to shepherd the people at that location, oversee it, and preach messages. Matt's last day with us is July 16, right after he returns from leading the students in our Guatemala missions trip (read more about that on page 13.)

Matt says, "I appreciate the time that I've had here, and the opportunities to learn what it's like

to serve at a church with multiple staff. I'm grateful for a strong volunteer team that I've been able to lead alongside of."

Matt says, "I am grateful for my time here, and for the many relationships that I've been able to build. I will pray for King Street, and I know God is going to continue to do amazing things through them."

It is difficult to say goodbye to such a dedicated, faithful team-member. Matt leaves behind a legacy of loving students well, speaking truth, and contributing in big ways to the larger work at King Street. And not unlike his own commitment to us, we will pray for him, knowing that God is going to continue to do amazing things through him as he follows God's call.

Sanctuary and Baker Center sections, the Ministry Center, and the Administrative Office building. It is over 122,000 square feet to clean and maintain -- equivalent to 49 average-sized homes in the US -- a huge and vital task!

A part of the team, one of Nathan's primary tasks is vacuuming our floors, and in May he began washing our 1,172 windows. Nathan also helps to move furniture and set up rooms for different events.

Nathan began attending King Street with his family in 2013. He was involved in The Street Student Ministry for many years.

He most recently worked in a maintenance position at a school, but was seeking a better

environment. While he admits that our facilities are much larger, he is definitely glad that he made the move. He says he is already enjoying the positive spirit of our custodial team.

Nathan volunteers at Camp Joy-El, so this is not the first time he has invested in the Kingdom. "I enjoy serving God and supporting our ministry," he says.

John Little, Facilities Manager, understands that the hard work done by our custodial staff is a sacred role. He refers to the many people who use our buildings: a thousand worshippers on Sunday mornings, hundreds of children and students meeting in a variety of spaces, those in adult Sunday School classes, Growing Tree Preschool, RESET worship and support groups, After-School program, basketball ministry, Bible studies, L3 groups, and so much more.

He says, "We are so glad to have Nathan with us as we provide a safe, clean environment for our church family to worship, and for God's work to be carried out here at King Street."

Prayer & Fasting Update

On Thursday, June 29, and Thursday, July 6, our church family joined church staff and leaders for 40 Days of Prayer & Fasting.

These services have been precious times of worship and prayer, gatherings of people who believe that God hears us, and that He has a plan for each of us individually as well as for our corporate body. The Middle School ministry room has been full of people saying — especially through the extra effort it takes to fast and to interrupt their schedules for a special meeting — "Lord, we trust You, and we seek Your will with all of our hearts."

We will continue to meet every Thursday at 6:00 pm in the Middle School Ministry Area (lower level of the Baker Center) to worship God together and hear a brief word from a pastor or leader. Then we break into smaller groups and seek God's guidance for

King Street during this season of transition. The last meeting is planned for Thursday, August 10.

We suggest a full day of fasting on these Thursdays, although those with any health/medical restrictions should certainly make whatever modifications are necessary.

The challenge is to be sustained by Jesus, to channel physical hunger into a spiritual desire for Him, and to pray when food cravings come.

It is not 40 solid days of fasting, just one day a week, Thursdays, the same day we will meet at 6:00 pm to pray. Ultimately, this part is a personal decision; please come and pray with us even if you cannot or choose not to fast! You can also abstain from something other than food... fast from social media, video games, etc.

We have been sending reminder texts on Thursday mornings for those signed up to participate. You can read more about what fasting means and sign up at <u>kingstreetchurch.</u> <u>com/40days</u>. It's also fine just to show up at our evening events (without fasting.)

Rob Gunkelman, Pastor of Middle School Student Ministries, was the one who shared the idea for the 40 Days of Prayer and Fasting with the pastoral team. He was introduced to a rhythm of prayer and fasting while serving at his first church.

"It put everyone on the same page." Rob says. "We were connected and invested." Rob describes that he would spend the dinner hour in personal prayer, which resulted in a intimate time with the Lord. Later when Rob went on to serve on the mission field, he did not keep up with the practice.

Until April. That's when he led 20 middle schoolers, plus a few parent leaders, in the 30 Hour Famine. They fasted a few hours on their own, then met to spend the final 24

hours together here at the church and serving with two local partner ministries.

The students really engaged with the times spent with God and did not complain about not being able to eat. It was a surprisingly successful experience. All of the students said they would do it again!

Rob says, "The 30 Hour Famine brought back the richness and the closeness that you can feel with God during that practice. I thought, we should do this for our staff. We should do this for our church!"

As a church, we are in a unique season of looking forward with anticipation -- knowing that God is about to do something new -- but also feeling the tension of wanting to make sure that we follow His dreams and visions for us.

Rob says, "When God's people come together in unity and prayer, He answers. Over and over again throughout the Bible and church history people have heard from God through the practice and discipline of fasting. In a time of transition, uncertainty, and need, we here at King Street Church should *feel excited*. We have an opportunity ask God to lead and guide us in this time and to hear from Him. During this 40 days of Prayer & Fasting, we are building unity, praying for discernment, and asking the Lord to help us update His vision for KSC."



On June 28 we concluded an amazing Vacation Bible School with our preschool and elementary children. We had 295 children registered and the average attendance each night was 268. The theme was "Keepers of the Kingdom: Standing Strong in Today's Battle for Truth."

Becky Hann, Director of Children's Ministries, affirmed, "It was a wonderful four nights."

Becky explained that while all of our VBS programs include memorizing Scripture, this particular program focused heavily on memorizing most of Ephesians 6:10-18, the passage which describes the armor of God. Each night the children learned a new part, and they repeated read it aloud in unison in the Sanctuary. This part of the night was one of Becky's favorites.

"I just loved hearing their young voices cry out as they loudly proclaimed the Word of God," she said, "Of course it is our hope that they will hold on to this truth for all of their lives."

Becky says other favorite parts include the drawbridge at our side entrance, the vibrant worship music, and the style of decorating. "It was the first time we've had dragons throughout the church!" she said, laughing.

While we can't quantify the impact of VBS in numbers -- and not all of those precious moments have been reported yet -- we know of at least 3 first-time confessions of faith, and 4 children who recommitted their lives to Christ.

The children raised \$4,544.87 in just 4 nights! The money will go to two organizations. Part will go to









Children's Hunger Fund, which provides food and the Gospel to children around the world, using local Christians. The rest will go to UB Global to be used in missions in Thailand.

Becky said the most special thing for her was recognizing that VBS is entirely run by our church family. Of course, she and our KidMin staff lead and organize, but it truly takes 150+ people all serving together to make VBS happen, and every year, our people do it!

Becky says, "I did not have to be up front, in charge... I was able to stand back and watch as everything came together. It was the church, our KSC body that led this Bible school. The people on the stage, the crew leaders, the worship leaders, the kitchen crew, the teachers in all of the rooms -- they were all volunteers."

While explaining this Becky became emotional. "I could just cry. It's so very humbling. It shows God is working. VBS is not a Becky Hann thing or a Crosswalk KidMin thing. It happens

Each month, printed copies of the latest Board summaries are also placed on the Information Walls in the lobbies.

April Board Highlights

Glenn Watson shared that the Project Priority Team met on March 20, and he presented the updated Project Priority List to the Board for review/approval. He advised that his term as Chairman of the Board will be expiring at the end of this year. Glenn presented the Board with a list of potential qualified candidates.

CO-MISSION REPORTS (alpha order)

Finance – Brad Etchberger stated that he and Dan Gehris have looked into a program offered by F&M Bank called IntraFi. It is a way to invest our money so it will be protected against any possible future financial volatility. Dan Gehris reviewed March 2023 and YTD financial figures, as well as Board approved projects. The Agape Ministry grant funds were discussed.

Local Outreach – Sharon Bowers shared that financial gifts were given to the Fruitbelt Farm Workers towards a new van, and the Cold Weather Shelter to purchase a new washer and dryer. The Local Outreach Co-Mission discussed ways to educate our church family about our partner ministries and ways for the congregation to serve with them.

Missions – John Schaffer shared about a request to send additional funds to churches in Haiti. There may be an opportunity to support Mission of Grace for hurricane repairs. There is still a need for Mission Co-Mission members. A motion was approved to send a financial gift to Orphan's Tree.

Personnel – Aaron Smith reported that plans have been finalized for the staff summer picnic. The LOC discussed future needs of the Agape English Ministry. A meeting to discuss the PRC hand-books will be scheduled.

Property – Gregg Thompson shared the need for sidewalk repair, and details of upcoming projects. The newly renamed Safety & Security Team will be in place soon. They will be trained in CPR/First Aid.

BOARD HIGHLIGHTS CONTINUED

May Board Highlights

Glenn Watson read a note of appreciation from Pastor Ron Cook for the KSC cycling shirt and gift card that he received during our April 12 meeting in appreciation for his extraordinary work.

Glenn Watson reviewed two motions that were passed via e-mail vote since the last meeting: on April 18, the motion to offer Dylan Chenaille the position of Part-Time Creative Arts Associate and on April 26, the motion to offer Nathan High the position of Full-Time Facilities Custodian/Maintenance Technician.

EXECUTIVE PASTOR REPORT

Pastor Steve Flint expressed his excitement with the hiring of Dylan Chenaille and Nathan High. Pastor Steve shared that a team preaching approach will be used in the coming weeks.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

Dan Gehris distributed and reviewed the changes to an updated Organizational Chart.

CO-MISSION REPORTS (alpha order)

Adult Ministry – Mark Willson reported that the Adult Ministry Co-Mission will be hosting L3 Group Leaders at their next meeting. Mark also reported that The Porch ministry will be celebrating its 2 year anniversary on May 16.

Finance – Brad Etchberger shared that the Finance Co-Mission agreed to increase the Student Grant amount (previously \$500) to a tiered structure now giving between \$1,000 - \$2,000 based on GPA. Brad made a motion for the new church treasurer after his term ends. The motion was approved to accept Ken Adams as the Church Treasurer beginning January 1, 2024. Dan Gehris presented the Board with April 2023 and 2023 YTD financial results.

Local Outreach – Sharon Bowers shared ministry partner updates. Once More Ministries handed out 275 boxes of needed items during the most recent distribution. Prayer was requested for the Agape English Program which continues to grow at a high rate.

Missions – John Schaffer shared that KSC has now given the entire \$168,000 to Haiti for disaster relief. Dylan Culler shared with the Missions Co-Mission plans to go to the Middle East before the end of this year. Dylan asked for prayers and help in financing his trip. The Missions Co-Mission is still in need of members.

Personnel Relations – Brian Mace reported several new members joined the PRC.

Property – Gregg Thompson shared that the Safety and Security Team will be fully staffed by the end of May. The trees at the Ministry Center will be trimmed and not removed.

Student Ministry – Nathan Rosenberger stated the student mission team still needs \$42,000 for the Guatemala Trip. Four middle schoolers made a first time decision for Christ after an Easter study.

Worship Arts – Carolyn Chenaille reported on the Appreciation Night that was held on May 7 for all those who assisted in any aspect of KSC's worship ministry. The event included a meal and a time of worship and prayer.

June Board Highlights

EXECUTIVE PASTOR REPORT

Steve Flint invited the Board to join together in singing "Jehovah," with Nathan Hann leading. Pastor Steve led the Board in a time of prayer. He shared that "40 Days of Prayer and Fasting" will begin on Thursday, June 22. A special time of

prayer will be held every Thursday at 6:00 pm in the Baker Center, ending on August 10.

ELDER REPORT

Greg West reported the Elder Team met with the Pastoral Team in May and will do so again in the future.

NEW BUSINESS

Glenn Watson facilitated the nomination process for the next Chairman of the Board (beginning on January 1, 2024). The nomination process was conducted and completed. The motion to approve Brad Etchberger as the next King Street Church Chairman of the Board was approved.

CO-MISSION REPORTS (alpha order)

Adult Ministry – Mark Willson reported that the Adult Ministry Co-Mission hosted leaders of the L3 Groups at their last meeting. They reexamined the launch concept of the L3 Program. The group participated in an exercise to listen, encourage, pray over fellow leaders in facilitating launching within their respective L3 groups

Children – Alexander Rosenbaum reported that the Children's Ministry Co-Mission had a Service Day to get ready for VBS which is being held from June 25-28. The VBS theme this year is, "Keepers of the Kingdom: Standing Strong in Today's Battle for Truth."

Finance – Brad Etchberger shared that the Finance Co-Mission approved a motion (on June 9 via email vote) to move the Generation Next Step funds from Merrill Lynch to a F&M Bank IntraFi Account which will guarantee us a 3.4% return each month for the near future. Dan Gehris presented the Board with May 2023 financial results 2023 YTD financial results.

Agape English Ministry

Agape English offers many different programs on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays. Bible study on Wednesdays is one of the most popular activities. Two Bible studies are taught at different skill levels. Retired pastor Buck Summers teaches the advanced Bible study. Buck speaks highly of his students. He says, "They are eager to learn English by reading the Bible and writing answers. Students ask good questions that allow us to explain and further examine the Scriptures."

The class is currently in the middle of a study on the book of John. They follow an English as a Second Language (ESL) curriculum that



helps students understand Biblical concepts and develop their skills in reading and writing. Buck cites John 14:6 as one of the most impactful verses in the study. "Jesus answered, 'I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.'"

The concept of new life is another important theme. Joseph has attended Agape English for many years. He says, "As a follower of Jesus, you serve Him and tell other people about Him. Jesus died for us to give us new life." Leorminda, another student, says, "It is important because Jesus died to give us new life and we will go to heaven."

Buck shares that some students have prior Christian teaching and some are believers. Many are curious to learn more about Christian faith. "All are open to hearing what the Scriptures have to say about Jesus," he explains.

Agape English serves dozens of people who are learning English as a second language. Once More Ministries Update

Once More Ministries (OMM) had our most recent distribution on **Saturday, June 10**. The Lord blessed us with a beautiful day to reach out to our community for Christ! We welcomed many thankful hearts. As usual, we seek not only to meet physical needs, but spiritual needs as well.



The last several distributions have seen increasing volumes of people stopping by for a little extra help to make ends meet. We like to be open until noon but have been exhausting our supplies by 11:30 am. We increased our number of boxes of toiletries in March and still ran out by 11:15 am.

We went with the same 275 again for June's distribution; incredibly, we ran out at 10:30! The stream of vehicles was constant. We remember the days when there was a lull—a chance to sit down, take a break, get a drink, rest—but that doesn't happen anymore. The traffic is non-stop until we're out of supplies and we block off the parking lot.

Friends, there is a LOT of need in our community! That need presents opportunities for us... for you... to connect with people in a way that may not have been possible without such a great need! Granted, our drive-through style distribution—a necessity in order to serve the great volumes of people who come—keeps us from a lengthy interaction. But we pray that each connection, short as it is, allows our



friends to see Christ's love for them through our gestures of good will, loving words, and smiles and the Biblical literature put into their hands.

Speaking of that literature, we need to mention that, thanks to Lindsey Michael and Sue Marshall for translating our handout into Haitian-Creole and Spanish (respectively), so that the most common languages we see can all receive the Good News. What a blessing this is!

Speaking of translations, we were incredibly blessed to have two translators for this distribution: Pierre Alcegaire (Haitian-Creole) and Carmen Durazo (Spanish). They were fantastic at communicating and interacting with our Haitian and Spanish friends. We are just "over the moon" to have them on board. Thank you, Pierre and Carmen! It was a joy to work with both of you!

Our Volunteers & Partners: We want to thank our very dedicated volunteers, without whom the day would not have been possible! The Lord blesses us every distribution with very servant-hearted and unselfish individuals who love to serve and connect with our community, and we are so thankful!

There is just not space to list out every name and the ways they have given of their time and resources. Please know that every gift is recognized and appreciated!

Our Friends: This distribution met the needs of 275 families, representing 1,038 people. We had many families from Chambersburg; they also traveled from Shippensburg, Fayetteville, St. Thomas, Greencastle, and Mechanicsburg. Languages of our families were as follows:

Missions Update

The Missions Commission is excited to give this update on our work with our partners and missionaries around the globe. Through your support, King Street Church is involved in a

variety of projects that help bring Jesus to the unreached, support churches, aid the extreme poor, and encourage and assist Christians who are persecuted.

In each of the past 3 years, the Missions Commission has been able to provide over \$100,000 in additional support (over our budget) to our partners thanks to your great generosity! This is a true testimony of gratitude for God's abundance, and allows us to demonstrate our Biblical concern as a church for those who are the least reached with the Gospel, crushingly poor, or who suffer greatly.

All gifts to the Missions Fund are anonymous – we don't know who has given – so we want to take this opportunity now to thank you for your generous support! To give to the Missions Fund, mark gifts "Missions"; you can also specify that through the website or by text. Again, thank you!

AREA UPDATES

Russia – Orphan's Tree added a 4th Ministry Center almost 2 years ago to reach young adult "orphan grads" who are trying to navigate life independently for the first time. The Russian staff has done an amazing job ministering to this vulnerable



group through the disruption of Covid and now, the broad impacts of the war. 40 grads are now involved in the new Ministry Center!

Haiti – Our 16 UB churches in Haiti are suffering through intense social unrest and violence that makes daily life difficult and dangerous in some areas. Gratefully, the school at Arcahaie continues to function as we help provide student meals, and about 80 children are currently sponsored by King Streeters as well.

Haiti Earthquake Aid - Through your gifts (and matching amount by the church Board), the



Missions Commission and the Haiti Barnabas Team were able to disburse over \$168,000 in relief and rehabilitation in response to the

deadly earthquake of 2021! 225 damaged homes were repaired, 2 UB church buildings repaired and strengthened, and educational and infrastructure services helped to get running again over the past 18 months. Thank you for this tremendous outpouring on behalf of our Haitian brothers and sisters! They send warm expressions of thanks as well.



Malawi – Rays of Hope and Cornerstone Ministries are focused on helping young people complete secondary school

and beyond, and offer a variety of helpful programs to support that goal. Our third partner, Namikango Mission, disciples and trains church leaders to lead effectively in the



country. They are transitioning their leadership to a Malawian ministry team after several decades! Rays of

Hope and Namikango are also ministering in the wake of Cyclone Freddy which caused massive flooding and destroyed homes and crops.

Thailand – In this primarily Buddhist country, the Cool Shade of Life Church led by Pastor Ogaat continues to send outreach teams to the Isaan region. They have seen a great response to the Gospel in a place historically very resistant. The church also occupies its new plot of land in a strategic area and is working toward plans for a new building and community center to help reach Chiang Mai.

Restricted SE Asia – In this rugged area of the globe, our partner's missionaries and national workers combine to take the Gospel into some of the remotest terrain imaginable. In parts of this region, the Gospel is illegal, and the risk of a confrontation with authorities is real. Despite that, over 500 new believers (!) put their faith in Christ last year and are forming small fellowships.

Persecuted Church –

One goal of the Missions Commission is to aid, pray, and advocate for persecuted believers wherever they are under pressure around the globe. We channel tangible support primarily through two organizations, Open Doors and Voice of the



Martyrs. They give physical aid where possible, and critical emotional and spiritual support to those who suffer trauma.

PERSONAL UPDATES

Emily Schoenleber has settled down, for the moment, from international travels and is serving with Global Catalytic Ministries from her location in Kentucky. GCM serves and resources the

underground church around the world, opening the way for people to become disciples of Christ in the places where that is hardest.

K & RW continue to help train and encourage church leaders in Turkey, which has become much more restrictive toward the Gospel. K & R were forced to leave their personal ministry there a few years ago, and have now expanded their efforts to help churches through the Middle East.

Children's Camps

R has finished writing the camp workbook, and in a few weeks ■ children's camps will begin! This year children will learn about Joseph's steadfastness as God's plan was worked out in his life. The ■ staff have served in the earthquake zone several times. ■ is also sponsoring children's activities in the area most affected by the earthquake. As a result the past few months have been full, and some camp preparations were delayed. Camps will run June 19-July 28 in various locations.

Earthquake Relief

Recently we heard a general update from major church groups who are serving in the earthquake zone. The major need now is housing, including ventilation, refrigeration and water. The government has been able to give limited help so far. In some areas only 30 to 40 percent of the rubble has been cleared. With tourism season beginning, hotels in other parts of will no longer house earthquake victims who were displaced. So many people are returning home to cities that do not have the infrastructure to sustain them.

New Missionaries

Next week, Lord willing, we travel to be part of a training team for a program in M evangelism. This program prepares future workers for ministry to M. The workers will serve everywhere from the USA to Indonesia. Later in June we will help train a different set of workers for general ministry overseas. We thank God that more of God's people are being readied to serve in the harvest field.

This past week a worker in ■ and three families serving alongside him were issued an entry ban,

the same ban that K was given in 2019. Some may wonder whether more workers should be sent to ■. We say Yes! Times have changed, and missionaries no longer have the "luxury" of living in ■ without some type of official work status. As in most other M countries, missionaries will need to live long term in ■ with a job (as in English teacher or business owner). We believe the help of trained workers will encourage our ■ brothers and sisters, so that both together can build up the church of Jesus Christ.

I feel so much more a part of the local community now than I did before the revival happened. After such a long, hard time of transition and settling in this has been such an answer to prayer! I am so grateful.

I also continue to really enjoy the Young Professionals group from church that I'm a part of. I think I mentioned before that every Thursday we gather together for a potluck dinner and then break up into small groups for Bible study! There's usually around 25-30 of us each week. I've been leading one of the small

groups during the current study that we're in and I'm really enjoying that! Also, it's so fun to have that group of friends and celebrate things like graduations and bridal showers with them! Praise God for such a sweet community.



A Testimony from the Middle East

Within GCM (Global Catalytic Ministries) we hear testimonies all the time of people encountering God and giving their lives to Jesus. It is such an honor for me to serve this

movement through administration and communications. Since our disciple makers primarily work in Islamic nations that are hostile towards Christians (and really any other religion) they talk about sharing "stories" with people. These "stories" are passages from Scripture that disciplemakers share with people to introduce them to the God that we know. So in these testimonies when people talk about the stories, they're talking about the Bible. Here's just one recent testimony we received:

"My name is Farah and I live in Afghanistan and I am married. Spiritually, I was very depressed because the government had fallen and our country was no longer a republic and my husband was a soldier in the previous regime. He was wanted [by the Taliban] and his life was in danger at every given moment because if they found him, they would kill him because they viewed him as an enemy and dangerous. I became tired of living a life on the run. All this caused me to really lose my way and to have no hope for life, until I met a couple who was different from everyone else. The happiness of this couple and the spirit they had, surprised me because everyone living in Afghanistan was depressed. I asked them the reason for their happiness and they said God had done miracles in their lives through some stories and I became very eager and asked them to share the stories with me. When I started, my mood miraculously changed and I felt peace inside. I had only read a few stories, when a miracle happened in my life and my husband was miraculously able to leave the country without any harm to him and now he is living in this other country preparing for my arrival. Whether or not I leave Afghanistan, I will be happy because God has changed my life from the inside and my faith in God has changed. Now I want to share the stories with

everyone and share this peace I have with everyone. I am hoping for the day when others read the stories and experience God's miracles."

"Come and Rest"

Recently, I had the opportunity to join in with a gathering at Asbury called the Awakening Project. Awakening Project is a network of emerging adults (and those who love them) who are unified in a desire to see a fresh move of God. The Awakening Project Conference meets each year for five days of worship, prayer, teaching, connecting, and fun. It was a joy to reconnect with people I met during the revival and also meet some amazing new people!

I've noticed I often learn the same lessons from the Lord, but on deeper levels as the years go by. A continual refining, sharpening, maturing. In every season of life, we have a temptation to focus on anything but the present. We look for the day when we'll land that job, or get married, buy a house, have kids, travel to that bucket list place. Or we get stuck in the past, and dwell on how we could've done things differently.

We're so conditioned by the culture around us to run and run and run and not slow down and constantly fill our minds and hearts with whatever we can find. Never leaving a moment to sit and just be still. Yet the Lord's invitation to us is to draw aside, to be with Him.

This has been a wrestle for me in recent months. The desire to be obedient and know what the future holds. My heart feels like it's been nonstop on a treadmill some days. A few days ago, the Lord brought that Augustine quote to mind and gently He reminded me that I was trying to find peace in knowing the next step, in knowledge of the future. But that will never give me what my soul is yearning for. And after all these years, His gentle invitation is still, "Come and rest."

Work Updates

Something I'm very excited to share with you all is that a friend of mine who leads a ministry in New Zealand reached out to me a couple of months ago to ask if I was willing to help out with some organizational and communication things for a project/gathering they're preparing for 2024! If you've followed my journey for a while, you'll know that I used to live in New Zealand and have a massive heart for it. I couldn't believe that the Lord was giving me an opportunity to serve NZ even while I'm living here. I prayed about it and felt to say yes to this amazing opportunity!

So far I've been helping with things like creating spreadsheets to keep track of ministry leaders in NZ who want to be a part of things next year, sending emails, and even helping schedule Zoom meeting and also joining those meetings to take notes. etc. It's been an adjustment learning to work with the time difference again, but such a blessing to my heart to work with Kiwis (New Zealanders). The Lord is so kind to me!

In light of these new opportunities and the increase in the work I'm doing for GCM, I made the decision to step down from working with FAI (Frontier Alliance International).
