

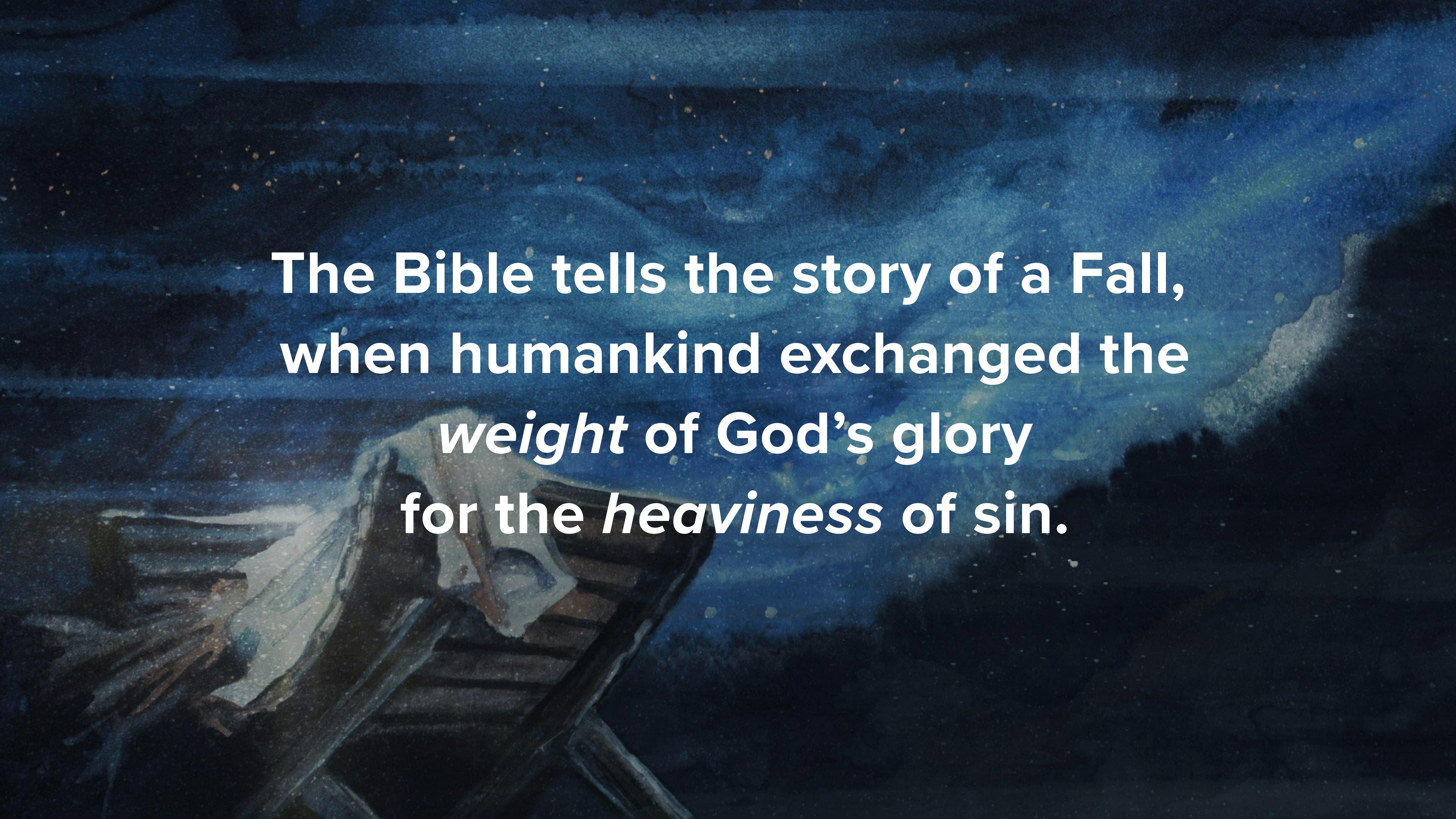


Christmas When Heaven Meets Earth

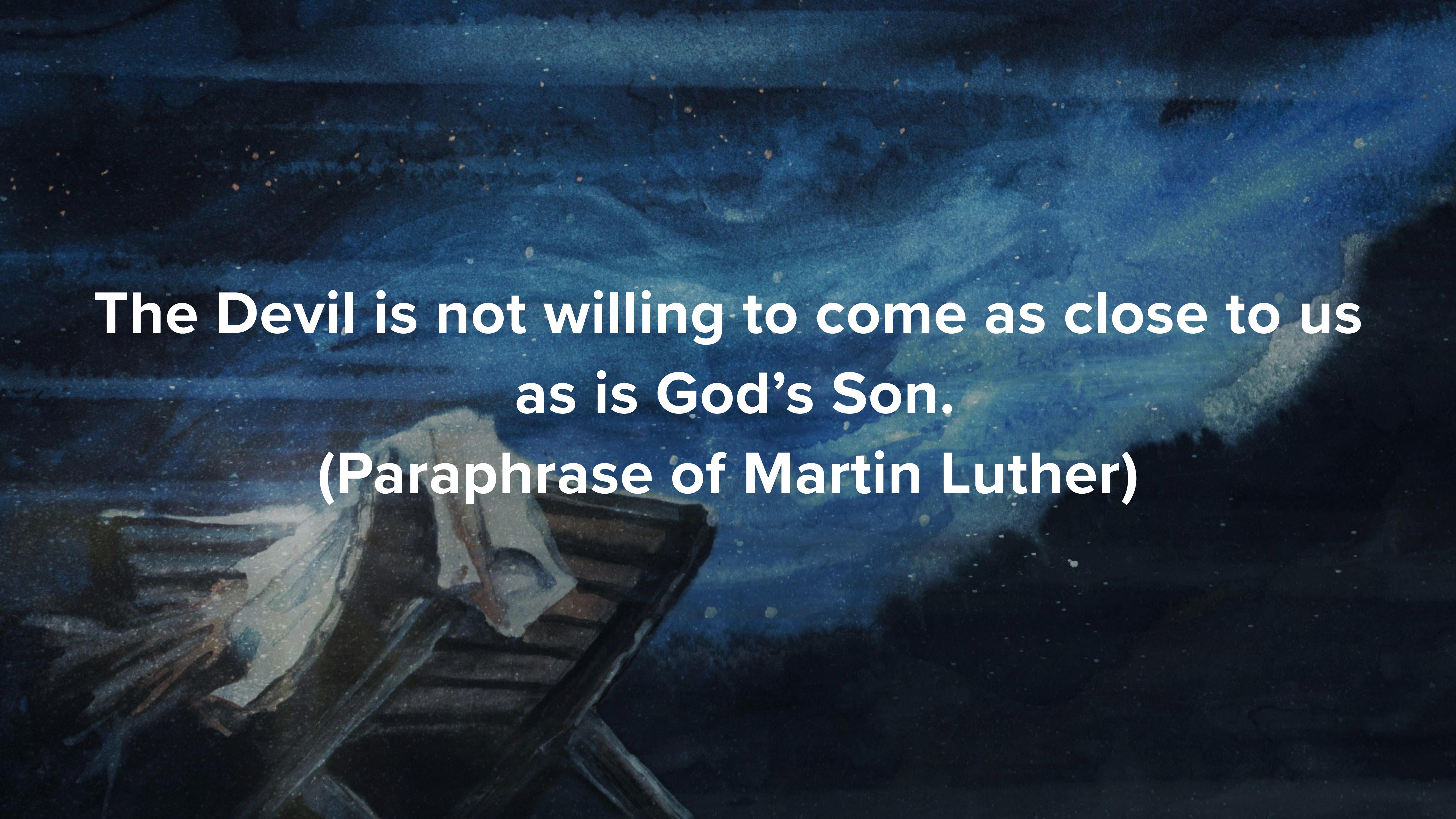
The Bible tells the story of a Fall,

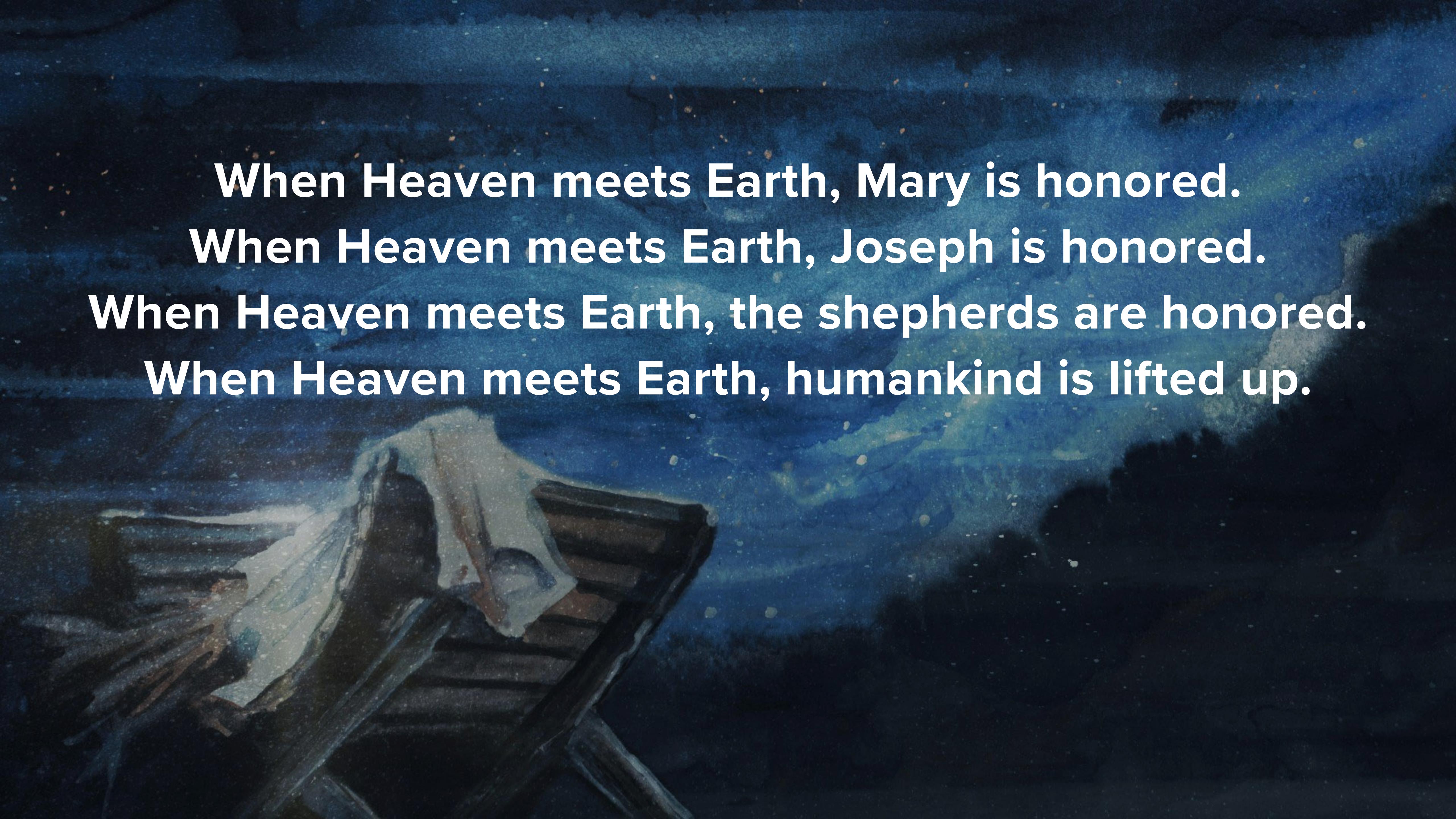

the heaviness of our sin.

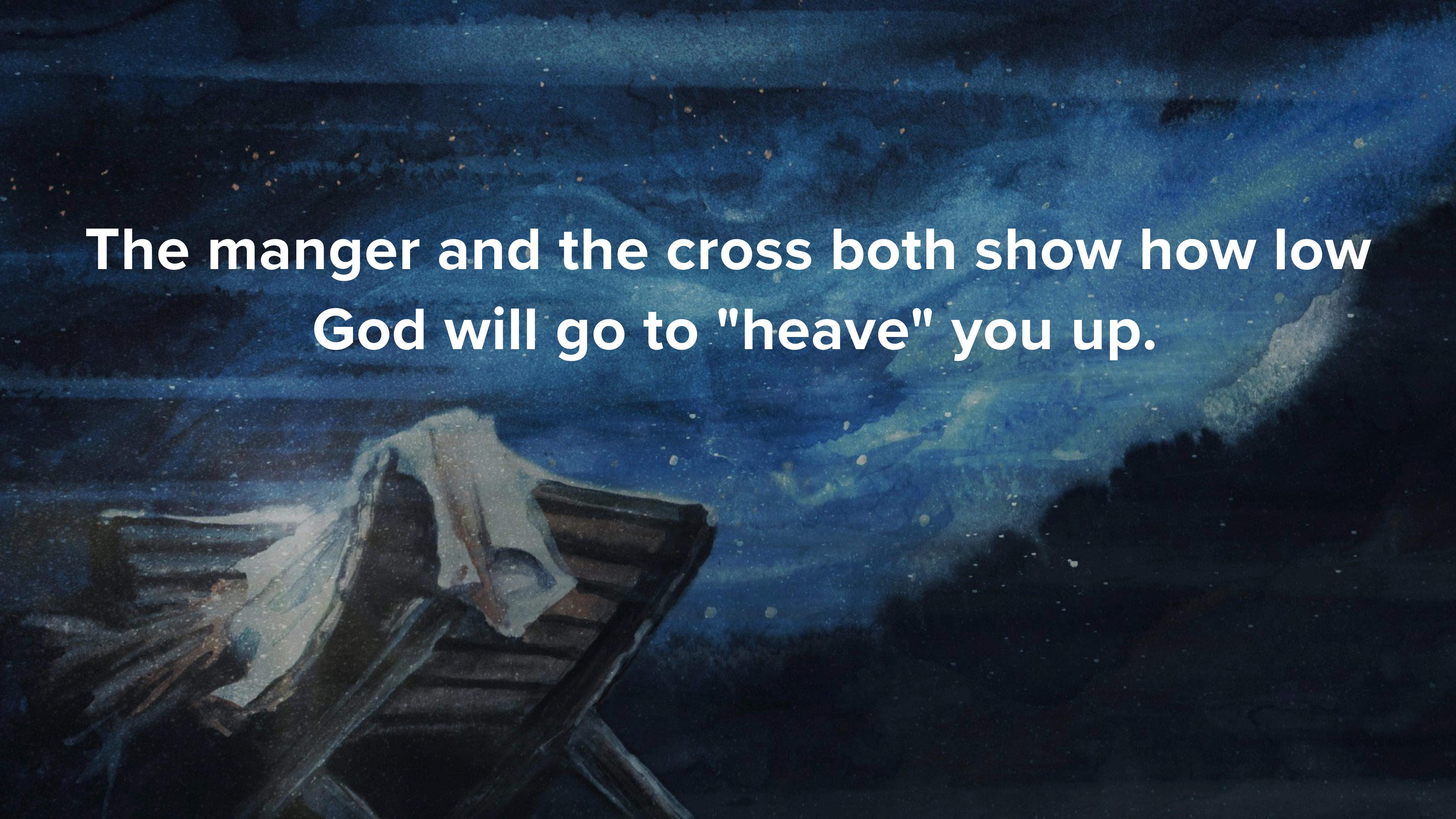


When Heaven meets Earth, Mary is honored.

When Heaven meets Earth, the shepherds are honored.

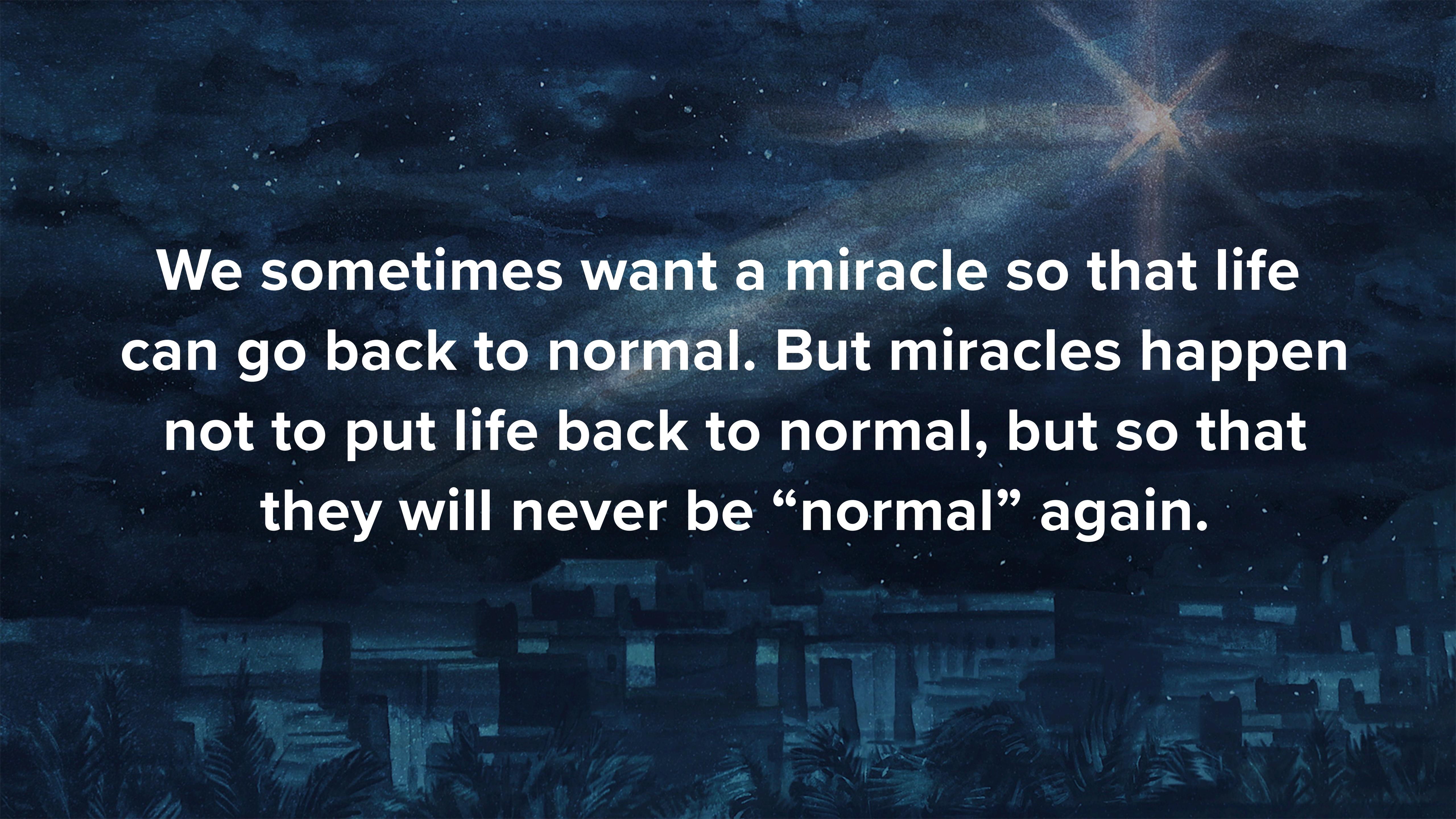
When Heaven meets Earth, humankind is lifted up.
